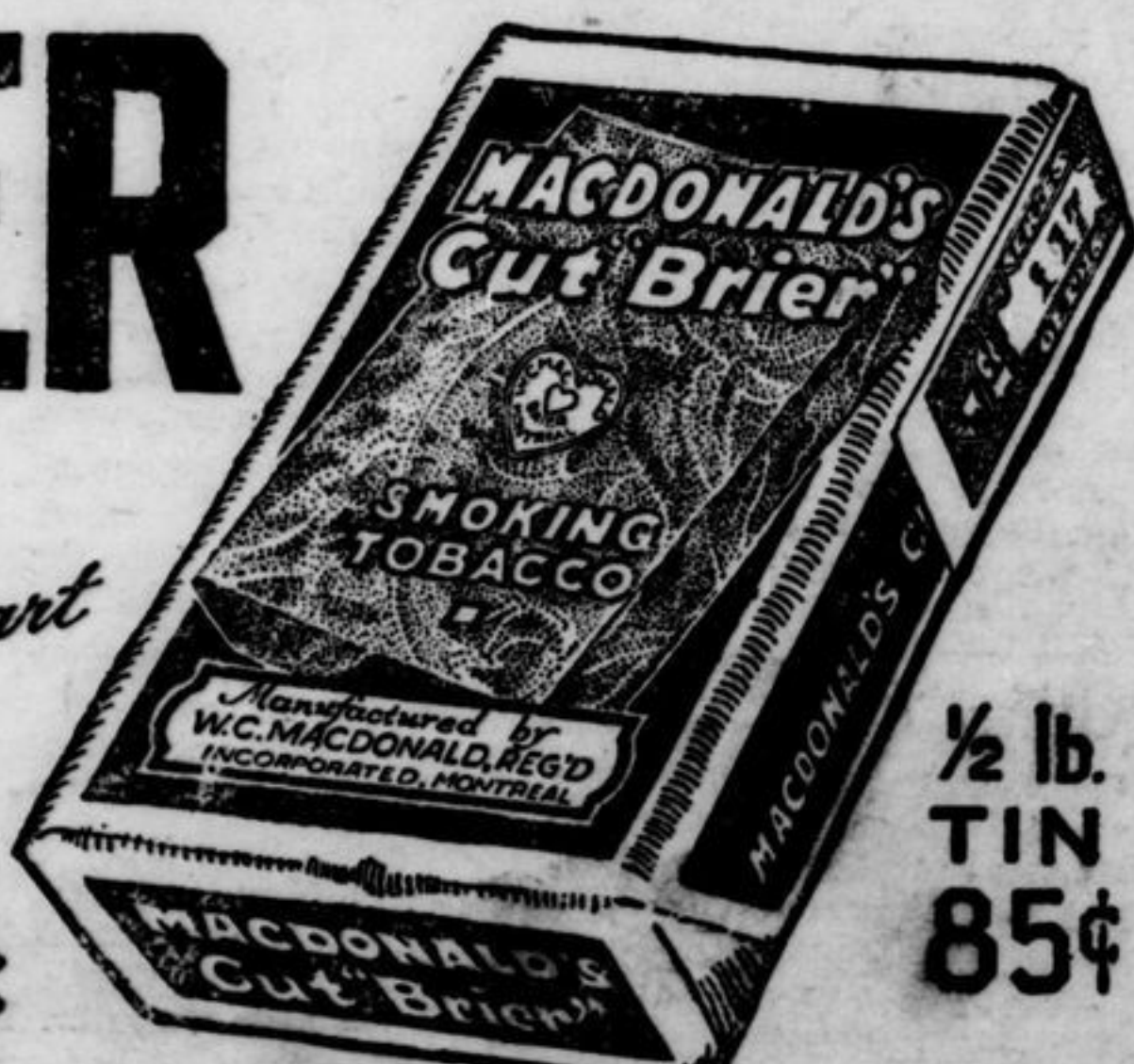

"Broadening Out"

Much interest has been and is being taken in the movement implied in the above heading. Hon. Mr. Drury is its great champion, while Mr. J. J. Morrison one of the leading lights in U. F. O. circles is opposed to it, against it having a fear that should the broadening out occur it would be a death blow to the U. F. O. movement.

As things are at present no town or city has a say in the selection of a candidate at a U. F. O. Convention (except through Labor representation) only farmers, members of clubs, can function as delegates.

Mr Drury's idea is to widen out so as to allow everyone, urban as well as rural, who believes in their policy or principles to share in their responsibilities. Mr Morrison would, if correctly reported, be opposed to all this.

It seems to us that if the restricting idea prevails it tends and does drive a wedge between town and country, that is injurious to both. Government, by any class, even farmers, who, we believe have their full share of the good sense of the community, does not tend to that harmony necessary to best progress. Mr Drury has shown a statesmanship and ability that commands respect to say the least and we believe will have at his back a great preponderance of the U. F. O. membership in the statesman like position he is now taking.

A Concession to Home Investors

In offering to renew the five and a-half per-cent. Canadian Government bonds maturing December 1st at the same rate of interest as is carried by the maturing bonds, and allowing a bonus of one month's interest, the Minister of Finance is making a material concession to the Canadian investor, as this rate is higher than was paid on the recent Canadian loan in New York. Education and Voting

Los Angeles Times: It does seem a pity that the mass of competence which the high school student has assembled by the time of his graduation should remain inert and unavailable for the immediate settlement of our national problems. It is proposed to change all this. The head of the California Teacher Association is crusading for the adoption of a law or constitutional amendment which shall instantly give the vote to the possessor of a high school diploma. After the graduation exercises are over the proud possessors might all take their sheepskins down to the polls and vote them. At any rate, under the new regime the franchise would at once fall like a mantle upon the graduate. As it is now some dull and uncouth vassal from Slavonia may be voting right along, while an American youth, with the nodding of Daniel Webster and the prophetic vision of Isaiah, will have to tarry at Jericho until his beard be grown before he can cast his ballot for the salvation of his country.

Irish Leader Shot

Michael Collins, head of the Irish Free State, was shot to death from ambush, on Tuesday. Coming so soon after Griffith's lamented death, it adds immensely to the trouble the Free State has in putting down Vatora and his rebels. We believe this tragic death will produce a public opinion in Ireland that will overawe the irregulars, and a new leader will be forthcoming.
