Mr. Gaby explained the difference in cost of operation between the Severn and Eugenia systems by the fact that at Eugenia they had some extraordinary items as in the operations of the turbines, which they had not at the Severn. The two systems were under the same general manager.

Mr. Gaby tried to explain this by saying that the cost per horse power was only one item. The price to domestic consumers had remained the same and power users had had one drop though later raised. He read a long list of figures to show that in many instances cost of transmission lines had been less than the estimates; but it had to be admitted that Durham and Mt. Forest had greatly overrun the estimates.

Mr. Filshie of Mt. Forest thought the local municipalities should be permitted to make minor repairs and that local inspectors might be appointed instead of having to wait on the inspector of the system. Mt. Forest rates had increased from \$34.40 to \$65 and they had to buy power at the peak rate. He thought the municipality should be able to sell power "off peak" to the best advantage.
