LLOYD GEORGE STEPS OUT.

Bonar Law His Successor

The Coalition Government headed by Lloyd George since early in the war is no more. At a meeting of the Conservative Carlton Club it was decided by a vote of 186 to 87 to disperse with the Coalition, and have the Government a purely Conservative one. Premier George at once took the challenge and resigned the position. The King, on his advice, called in Bonar Law, and asked him to form a government which he has done. The change was made in 72 days, already an election is announced and before November is over a new House will be elected. So expeditions is British political ways: A number of coalition Conservatives, admirers of Lloyd George, are still adhering to him, amongst them Lord Balfour, and for a month there will be "doins" in the Old Land. It would be no surprise to see the people through the elections, place Lloyd George in power again.

Robt. E. Laidlaw Appointed Crown Counsel

To Conduct Examination of Witnesses Regarding Hailybury Fires.

An inquiry under the Fire Marshal's Act into the Hailybury and north country fire, was opened at the Parliament Buildings in Toronto on Monday, for the purpose of determining the cause, origin and circumstances of the fire. Fire Marshal L. Heaton has appointed R. E. Laidlaw, of Toronto, a well known Durham boy and son of Magistrate and Mrs. Laidlaw, to conduct the examination of witnesses and to serve as Crown Counsel.

All refugees in Toronto whose information would be of assistance in the inquiry, were invited to give their evidence and tell anything they knew without fear of being subjected to a critical cross examination.

On Wednesday evening the Fire Marshal's party leave for Hailybury and two days will be spent in interviewing and arranging to call witnesses who will be able to testify from actual observation of events prior to, during and after the fire. On Monday, Oct. 30th, the first open session will be held in the office on wheels, which will be side tracked by the T. & N. O. Railway in the yards, and continuously until all the Crown witnesses have been examined. Opportunity will then be given to all those desiring to give evidence to do so. The sittings will then be transferred to North Cobalt, New Liskeard, and other central points.

Mr. Laidlaw, who has been appointed Crown Counsel, is probably recommended for the post by his unusual combination of abilities as a civil engineer and as a lawyer, being a graduate of the School of Practical Science as well as an Osgoode Scholarship man. Two weeks ago he commenced a series of lectures which he is giving at the University, on Engineering Law, this being the first course of lectures of the kind in any Canadian University. Before taking up the practice of law, Mr. Laidlaw had some engineering experience in assisting with the valuation of the American Railroads for the Interstate Commerce Commission and in other ways.

Mr. Laidlaw has conducted the investigation of several fires, among others the Forum Building fire, the Levy Departmental Store fire at Hamilton, the fire which devastated the village of Newbro, the Dairy School at Kingston and a number of spontaneous combustion fires.
