Durham Opens Hospital.

The following complimentary reference appeared in last week's *Fergus News-Record* under the above heading. Only two small errors occur in the article, and they relate to Durham, not to the hospital. The *News-Record* calls us a village. It is *Fergus* which is just a village, while Durham has held town status over forty years. And Durham is "only about half the size of *Fergus*." Why, Dr. Templin, we're about up to you in population. Durham has passed the 1600 mark, while *Fergus* at last figures we noticed had between 1800 and 1900. Here is the write-up:

"The Durham Hospital was opened on November 16th, and is in every way a credit to the village. More especially is this so, when it is remembered that Durham is only about half the size of *Fergus* and they have had to do all the work themselves."

The hospital building is situated on a beautiful piece of rising ground overlooking the Saugeen River, and is complete in all the ordinary appointments of a modern hospital. The present capacity of the hospital is about fifteen patients with provision made for extension. The rooms are simply but beautifully furnished, and the operating room is most suitable and convenient.

We congratulate the people of Durham on their broad-minded spirit which made the achievement of their purpose possible. The pettiness so common to small places, seems to be absent here.

It is remarkable how the benefits to be derived from having a hospital have impressed themselves on the people in the last few years. Twenty two years ago there was not one hospital north of Guelph. Now there are nine, all going along successfully in their great and good work.

A compliment was paid to *Fergus* by the people of that northern town when they asked Dr. Groves to perform the first operation, the Dr. being well-known there, where his ability as a surgeon is appreciated."

Congratulations to Mr and Mrs Campbell Dunsmoor on the arrival of a young son.

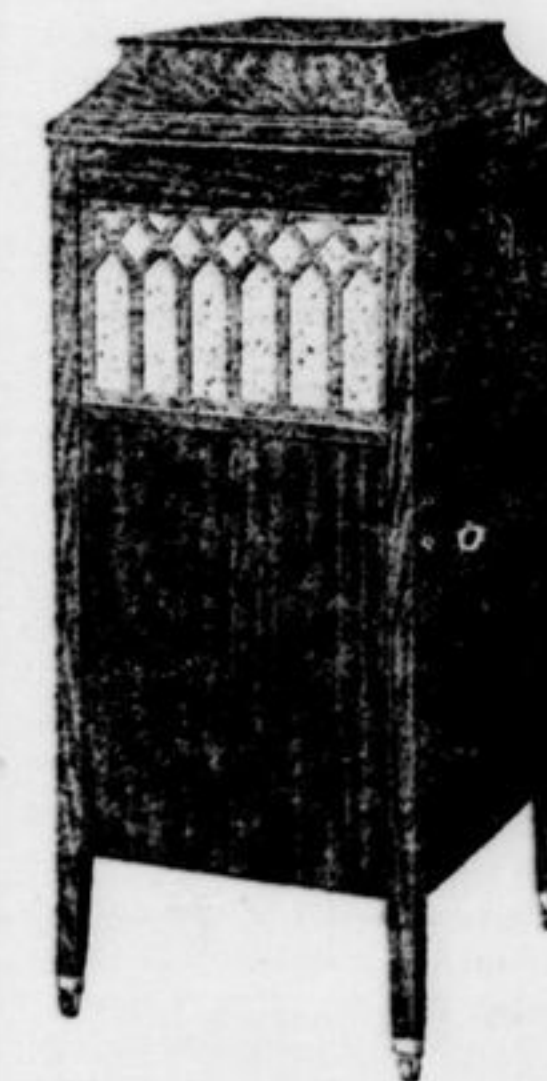
