The ory of concerts in town that have been and are to be, appear to place Durham people as good concert goers, for we have yet to hear of any entertainment this season going on the "hole." The Baptist Church Tuesday night, while not filled, was well patronized, no doubt to hear the Indian Cree entertainer, Frances Nickawa. This young lady is a product of a Northern Ontario Mission School and her work shows that of careful and diligent training. In company with her tutor, she has spent the past season in England, and she only recently has come back, benefited from her numerous experiences. To us, the incongruity of an Indian lady giving darkey selections, was apparent. However her native people, the Indian received the best interpretation and it was here she shone. Fine line Johnston numbers were rendered with much fire and insight, and "Canadian Born" by this author, received a thrilling hearing. "Hilwath's wooing" by Longfellow, was also given with finish and to many moving fresh interpretation at her hands. In these numbers she wore the complete Indian costume. Miss Nickawa was assisted by Master Eben Cameron, who gave several vocal selections and also recited. Misses Blanch Boyce and Adeline Graham also rendered a duet during the program.

An inquest was deemed unnecessary, heart failure being the cause of death. He was 43 years of age and unmarried. Besides Mrs. Saunders, two other sisters and four brothers are left to mourn his demise: Alex., in Kincardine; Jno., Dan and Neil in the West. The family were former residents of Priceville vicinity, where the deceased was born, but removed to the West many years ago.

**Good Roads Meeting.**

An important meeting in the interest of good roads was held in Toronto last week. Delegates from most of the municipalities bordering on the Provincial County Road from Hanover to Southampton were present, and the importance of this east and west highway was duly impressed on the officials by Reeve Calder and others. Egremont township was also represented on the delegation. Dundak asked for \$1000 from the government, they having complied with requirements in spending the County grant. They were bluntly refused, but the pressure used by the delegation resulted in the grant being given. For "County Roads", "Provincial County Roads" and "Provincial Highways", the government pays 20, 40 and 60 per cent respectively for construction and maintenance.

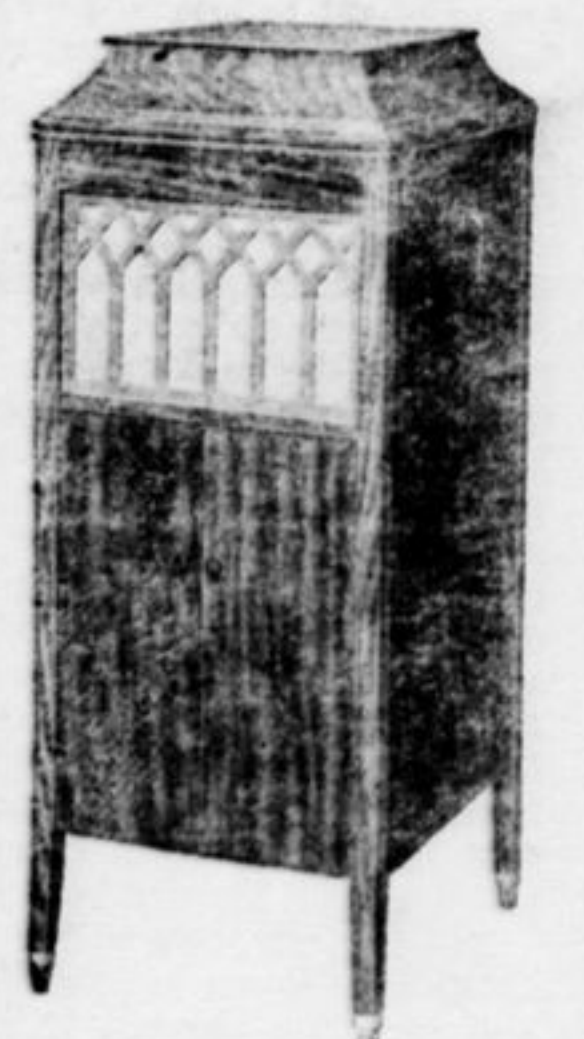

## Who Will be Warden of Grey for Next Year?

Grey County Council will select its Warden amongst those selected as Reeves and Deputies of the towns, villages or townships, when they meet in January.

So far there are three candidates for the Wardenship and possibly more. Each of these three have been nominated for the position before and the race amongst them will be a lively one.

Emerson Brown, reeve of Collingwood, is a candidate. He has been a member of the Good Roads committee for several years, is bright and is a hard worker.

Dan McTavish is reeve of Flesher-ton and has held that office for almost ten years. He has been on almost all the committees in the county council and chairman of some of the more important ones. He has been a severe critic of the chairman of Good Roads, Reeve Calder, and has provided a great deal of the fire works at the regular meetings.

John Miller is reeve of Euphrasia. He has been an annual candidate for wardenship for the past six or seven years, but has always lost out, some times with a narrow margin. He has been on many committees.

Then there is always the possibility of still other candidates being in the field when the January smoke has cleared.

Next year's County Council will contain not less than six persons not previously in that august body. McLeod, Thornbury, Markdale, Durham, Dundak, and several other urban municipalities will have new Reeves next year. Ex-Warden Sing and Ex-Warden Calder will drop out. Reeve McArthur of Markdale has decided that he has had enough. Reeve McDowd, one of the brightest men of the Council, will be away a great deal and decided that he will retire.

Then there are quite a number of representatives from the townships that may retire. Warden Howey said he would not be a candidate next year but if the honor were thrown on him he might be back. There will be contests in a number of the townships and it is possible that at least a third of the council will be composed of new men. —O. S. Sun Times.

We have heard Councillor Dr. Smith's name mentioned for the Mayor's seat. He would make a splendid official, and would be practically certain of an acclamation should he decide to stand. And how about Mayor Allan as our new Reeve? In Glenelg and Egremont, new aspirants for the Reeveship are old standbys round the Council table. We learn Dep. Reeve Alex. Allan is out for the honors in Egremont and Councillor Thos. Turnbull in Glenelg. Reeve Hunt in Bentinck is not likely to get opposition.
