

It is known by most gardeners that cabbage, parsnips, turnips, salsify, ets, too. 10, 25, 50 cents. ency toward phonetic spelling in an the ancient Thomond), and also in and carrots are not injured by freezing, provided they thaw out while in contact with the earth or soil, but it is also a fact that certain winter vegetables are not at their best until they have been frozen hard at least once while in the ground. Parsnips and salsify especially, should stand in the ground until there has been weather cold enough to freeze several inches, then the roots may be dug and stored in an open pit and covered with dirt. The covering may be sufficiently heavy to prevent further freezing if it is desired to go into them during the winter, but it will do no harm if covered only a few inches so that they will freeze and thaw several times. They will be of better texture and flavor by having frozen. Turnips should not be allowed to freeze more than once, and cabbage also keeps best if covered well after the heads have frozen once or twice and thawed out under ground. The stalks should also be covered with soil when in storage, as the frost will come down them into the head if they protrude and are allowed to freeze and thaw a number of times.




