### Honor to Mrs. Whelan

A recent issue of Hamilton Spectator gives prominence to a civic reception tendered to workers in Serbian relief during the war. The presentation of "The Cross of Mercy", the highest Imperial Serbian honor, was made by the Serbian Consul-General to Canada, by the order of the King of Serbia. A number of Hamilton women received the handsome gift, and amongst whom we were pleased to note Mrs. J. P. Whelan. Her many friends here believe that none would be more worthy.

### Methodist Concert a Success

The Sunday School of the Methodist Church, "put on" their annual Christmas concert on Monday night and were greeted by a full house. The town hall never held a more animated bunch of small humanity. Mr. Will Glass who is superintendent, gave the chairman's seat to Rev. C. G. Cole, and held it creditably well. He announced the Sunday School as in a flourishing and growing condition, the past Sunday having no fewer than 109 present. Mrs. (Rev) Cole was responsible for the evening's program, and when one is let out at 11 p. m. there is nothing more necessary to add. At the close of the program, Mr. Will Glass called this lady to come to the platform and as well as having a complimentary address read, was presented with a hand painted sandwich tray and pieces of Adam design Community plate. The recipient responded in a few well chosen words, and said it was work that she loved to do. The Methodist orchestra enlivened the evening with several numbers, and the remainder of the program was given by the scholars of the school. It would be useless to enlarge on these numbers, and only the "flower drill" and "Vesper Virgins", are being singled out as of special beauty. The Sunway School exchequer will be considerably enriched by this concert.

## Municipal Aspirants are Lining Up

There are good prospects of election contests in most of the municipalities in this neighborhood New Year's Day. The nominations on Friday will tell the tale, and those who decide to "run" will have more than a full week to win the approval of the electors.

### J. LEVINE

In Durham, with Mayor Allan definitely retiring, Dr. J. L. Smith is stepping up after two years good service in the Council, and he will in all probability be accorded the Mayoralty by acclamation. Barrister A. B. Curry has consented, upon solicitation of friends, and since Mr. A. J. Cutton is not in the field, to contest the Reeveship, and is definitely out against all comers. It is uncertain whether he will have opposition.

Bentinck will likely be quiet election day. Reeve Hunt and the Council seemed to have given good service and the former will almost certainly be given a second term, whether there is a contest or not. F. Schmidt and R. Brigham have been mentioned as Reeveship prospectives, but are unlikely to stand.

With Reeve McQuinn and Coun. Thos. Turnbull in the field, there is every prospect of a lively battle for the Reeve's chair in Glenora. All the present Council will stand if it is expected, and aspirants mentioned are Albert Livingstone, who ran so close last year, and Alex. Aljoe, of No. 3 District.

In Egrement Reeve McEchern will seek a second term, but will likely meet opposition. Either John McArthur or C. McInnis may face him again, or possibly other aspirants. Alex. Allan, we learn, will likely stay another year with the Deputy-Reeve-ship.

Normanby is sure to have a fight with Dep. Reeve Finsinger stepping up to contest the Reeve's seat with Reeve Holm. Councillor Miller will run for deputy reeve, with Jno. Whitford his probable opponent. Richard Barber is again in the field for Councillor.

### CLOSING SESSION OF COUNCIL

The last meeting of Durham Council was held on Friday last when settlement was made of a few contentious things. An account of Mr. Laidlaw again met with the opposition of the Reeve as being a county matter, but on motion of McDonald—Adams, it was ordered paid in the meantime and look to the County to make good.

The Allan Bell account of \$14 for an indigent interment six weeks ago, was also ordered paid, again the Reeve alone entering his protest and vote against it, as being a dangerous precedent. Coun. Adams voting with him.

Earl McDonald was granted a rebate of \$4.40 which was a business tax wrongfully imposed as he has no place of business. A premium of \$114.60 on the Jackson building was also ordered paid to Mr. Calder.

The Treasurer's report was received and 100 copies ordered to be printed.

Clark Metals was given a rebate of general taxes for 1921 and 1922, which does not include school and frontage tax.

Smith—Saunders: That the thanks of this council be tendered to the Mayor for his efficiency and courtesy in discharging his duties for the past year. This was carried and Mayor Allan replied thanking them for their action and for their cooperation during the year. He also announced that he would not again be a candidate for the Mayoralty and thus 1922 council passed into history.

### WIDENED JURISDICTION

We congratulate Police Magistrate Laidlaw on having his field of operations widened as the following copy of an Order-in-Council approved by His Honour, the Lieutenant Governor on Dec. 5th last will show:

Upon the recommendation of the Honourable the Attorney General, the Committee of Council advise that William Laidlaw, now Police Magistrate in and for the Town of Durham, be also appointed Police Magistrate in and for the Townships of Bentinck, Glenora, Normanby, Egrement and Proton, his jurisdiction in the said townships to be concurrent with that of other Police Magistrates now having jurisdiction therein: the said Police Magistrate to have the privilege of practising a profession or actively engaged in business, trade or occupation until otherwise directed by Order-in-Council.

### Preview Plant Resue

Getting out two Financial Statements in the brief time between the last meetings of Council and nomination day, has caused us a busy week of night and day work and made it impossible to change the many labors that need attention. ### Increased School Accommodation Wanted

The report of High School Inspector Rogers, whose visit was made in October last, was read at the meeting of the High School Board on Thursday evening last. The grading he gives the equipment, the staff, some other points, is generally satisfactory, but on the school accommodation and the increasing attendance, he points out plainly the handicap to efficient work caused by the congested state of the rooms. As is generally known, even the Scotch room has to be used as a class room, and there is provision for neither gymnasium nor Assembly room.

Along with the report or soon after, the Secretary received the following letter from the Deputy Minister of Education, from which it will be seen with what urgency the Department sees the necessity of increased accommodation in Durham High School.

Toronto, Oct. 26, 1922  
Sec'y High School Board:  
Dear Sir,—

I am directed by the Minister of Education to draw your attention to the recent report of Inspector Rogers on the Durham High School in which he draws attention to the difficulty of providing satisfactorily for the increased attendance with the present accommodations and equipment.

The importance of the work undertaken by this school and the large district it served make it imperative that as soon as practicable some action be taken by your Board to carry out the recommendations contained in this report.
