There are good prospects of election contests in most of the municipalities in this neighborhood New Year's Day. The nominations on Friday will tell the tale, and those who decide to "run" will have more than a full week to win the approval of the electorate.

In Durham, with Mayor Allan definitely retiring, Dr. J. L. Smith is stepping up after two years good service in the Council, and he will in all probability be accorded the Mayoralty by acclamation. Barister A. B. Currie has consented to stand as a candidate of friends, and since Mr. A. A. Carton is not in the field, to contest the Reeveship, and is definitely our against all comers. It is uncertain whether he will have opposition.

Bentinck will likely be quiet election day. Reeve Hunt and the Council seem to have given good service and the former will almost certainly be given a second term, whether there is a contest or not. F. Schmidt and R. Brigham have been mentioned as Reevehip prospects, but are unlikely to stand.

With Reeve McGuire and Coun. Thos. Turnbull in the field, there is every prospect of a lively battle for the Reeve's chair in Gleng. All the present Council will stand. It is expected, and aspirants mentioned are Albert Livingstone, who ran so close last year, and Alex. Atjee, of No. 3 District.

A Tragic Death

An extremely sad death occurred in Collingwood recently, when Mrs. Wm. Williams, wife of the principal of Collingwood Collegiate, died under tragic circumstances. The deceased lady had been calling one evening at a neighbor's house, and on leaving, somehow became turned in the direction she should take, and went the opposite way to that which she should. She wandered for some time and the family becoming anxious, when not returning, started a search party. In the early hours of the morning she was found on the limits of the town exhausted and life extinct.

Sent Memorial Certificates

The December meeting of the Women's Misiary Society of the Presbyterian church was held Thursday last when the annual reports were given by the various Secretaries. An interesting paper was read by Mrs. A. H. Jackson and prepared by Miss Bella McGinn on "Immigration," our church's duty to the newcomers that enter our land. Mrs. Jackson with Mrs. Stonehouse, also contributed a pleasing duet. The Society have raised by subscription over \$50, for two "Memoriam" certificates to be sent to Mrs. Helen Whaley Tavistock, and Dr. and Mrs. Farquharson, Toronto, in memory of the former's late husband and pastor of the church and the latter's two sons, who died a few years ago. CLOSING SESSION OF COUNCIL

The last meeting of Durham Council was held on Friday last when settlement was made of a few contentious things. An account of Mr. Laiddlaw again met with the opposition of the Reeve as being a county liability but on motion of McDonald—Adams, it was ordered paid in the meantime and look to the County to make good.

The Allan Bell account of \$14 for an indigent interment six years ago, was also ordered paid, again the Reeve alone entering his protest and vote against it, as being a dangerous precedent, Coun. Adams voting with him.

Carl McDonald was granted a rebate of \$4.40 which was a business tax wrongfully imposed as he has no place of business. A premium of \$114.60 on the Jackson building was also ordered paid to Mr. Calder.

The Treasurer's report was received and 100 copies ordered to be printed.

Clark Metals was given a rebate of general taxes for 1921 and 1922, which does not include school and freight tax.

Smith-Saunders: That the thanks of this council be tendered to the Mayor for his efficiency and courtesy in discharging his duties for the past year. This was carried and Mayor Allan replied thanking them for their action and for their co-operation during the year. He also announced that he would not again be a candidate for the Mayoralty and thus 1922 council passed into history.

WIDENED JURISDICTION

We congratulate Police Magistrate Laiddlaw on having his field of operations widened as the following copy of an Order-in-Council approved to His Honour, the Lieutenant Governor on Dec. 5th last will show:

"Upon the recommendation of the Honourable the Attorney General, the Committee of Council advise that William Laiddlaw, now Police Magistrate in and for the Town of Durham, be also appointed Police Magistrate in and for the Townships of Bentinck, Glenelg, Normandy, Egremont and Proton, his jurisdiction in the said townships to be concurrent with that of other Police Magistrates now having jurisdiction therein: the said Police Magistrate to have the privilege of practising a profession or actively engaged in a business, trade or occupation until otherwise directed by Order-in-Council."

Increased School Accommodation Wanted

The report of High School Inspector or Rogers, whose visit was made in October last, was read at the meeting of the High School Board on Thursday evening last. The grading is given the equipment, the stairs, the windows, the play ground and some other points is generally satisfactory, but on the school accommodation and the increasing attendance he points out plainly the handling of efficient work caused by the congested state of the rooms. As is generally known, even the Science room has to be used as a class room, and there is provision for neither gymnasium nor Assembly room.

Along with the report or soon after, the Secretary received the following letter, from the Deputy Minister of Education, from which it will be seen with what urgency, the Department sees the necessity of increased accommodation in Durham High School.

Toronto, Oct. 26, 1922

St. George's High School Board:

Dear Sir,—

I am directed by the Minister of Education to draw your attention to the recent report of Inspector Rogers of the Durham High School in which he draws attention to the difficulty of providing satisfactorily for the increased attendance with the present accommodations and equipment.

The importance of the work undertaken by this school and the large district it serves make it imperative that as soon as practicable some action be taken by your Board to carry out the recommendations contained in this report.
