Hereditary Legislators.

The Flesherton Advance gives currency to the rumor that, contrary to expectation, Hon. L. B. Lucas will not again attempt to capture East Grey from Hon. Col. Carmichael, the only man who ever beat him. Instead it is hinted that Hon. L. B. would not be averse to having the affection of the Conservative party rest upon his son, now a barrister in Toronto, and no doubt inheriting some of his father's ability.

However it is surmised that there will be lack of harmony in the party over the suggestion. The northern district, Meaford especially, feels that the South has had the honors long enough, and no doubt has some "fayrite son" ready to step into the breach, without calling in a non-resident.

From East Grey to South Grey is only a step, and no such division between North and South or East and West exists here. Hon. Dr. J.—the defeated candidate in last election, has a resident son who also has ability, and it might be that his father's mantle may fall on his shoulders. We are not suggesting this, nor have we heard rumors in that direction, but the parallel in the two Ridings is quite marked, and we leave it there.

Elmwood Harness' Suicided

One of the saddest tragedies ever enacted in this section took place at Elmwood about 7.30 o'clock on Monday morning, Feb. 12th, when Mr. Wm. Evers, a well-known young harness merchant of that village, stabbed to death with a butcher knife, severing his wind-pipe and causing death a short time afterwards. His wife, dying in another room with pneumonia, succumbed some hours later, without knowing that her husband had preceded her in death. By this double fatality, six children, ranging in age from 2 to 11 years, are left orphans, one of them being at present critically ill with the flu.

It seems that Mr. Evers was convalescing himself, from a week's illness of influenza, and being distracted by the critical condition of his wife, who was dying from pneumonia, besides, it is said, being burdened with financial worries, became temporarily disengaged and proceeding to the kitchen seized a butcher knife, and slashed his throat. His little daughter, beholding the blood gushing from her father's wound, ran screaming to the street for help, and Mr. Thos. Henderson, a general merchant of Elmwood, who was attracted by the girl's cries, rushed to her aid, and found Mr. Evers on his hands and knees in a pool of blood on the kitchen floor, with a butcher knife at his side. Suspecting what had happened, he assisted the prostrate man to a chair, and had the village doctor hurriedly summoned to the scene. An examination of the wound revealed that his throat had been cut almost from ear to ear, and the windpipe severed. Lapsing into an unconscious state, the unfortunate man passed away a short time later.—Walkerton Herald Times.

Miss MacPhail's Questions:

- How many Consuls and Commercial Agents has the United States resident in Canada?
- How many Consuls and Commercial Agents has the U. S. resident?
- Is it the intention of the Government to appoint enough Commercial Agents in the United States to adequately take care of Canadian trade interests and foster Canadian trade?
- Not why?

Right Hon. Mr. MacKenzie King:

- There are ninety-one consular representatives of the United States in Canada. So far as the government is informed there are no officials of the United States resident in Canada designated as Consular Agents.
- Canada has no foreign consular representation distinct from Great Britain. The Department of Trade and Commerce has no commercial agents in the United States. It has, however, one trade commissioner's office in New York City.
- 3 and 4. The question of appointing trade commissioners in the United States has been considered at various times. Up to the present, owing to the proximity of the two countries and the cost of maintaining trade commissioners, appointments have been confined to foreign countries where commercial information is not accessible to Canadian exporters.

Miss MacPhail:

1. In view of the fact that a large volume of trade is done between Canada and the United Kingdom, what steps has the government taken to appoint representatives in Great Britain to foster and encourage Anglo-Canadian commerce?

2. What officials with technical knowledge of Canadian trade are attached to the High Commissioner's office in London?

Right Hon. Mr. MacKenzie King:

- The Department of Trade and Commerce have established officers and trade commissioners in the United Kingdom as follows: London, Liverpool, Manchester, Bristol, Glasgow. The trade commissioners and their assistants foster and encourage Anglo-Canadian commerce.

2. On the staff of the High Commissioner there are two officers with long association with Canadian trade who are able to deal effectively with any commercial enquiries received. They are attached to the office a special customs investigation officer. The Dominion trade commissioner in London and trade commissioners throughout the United Kingdom are also in immediate association and close touch with the High Commissioner's office.

TUTANHAMEN'S TOMB
