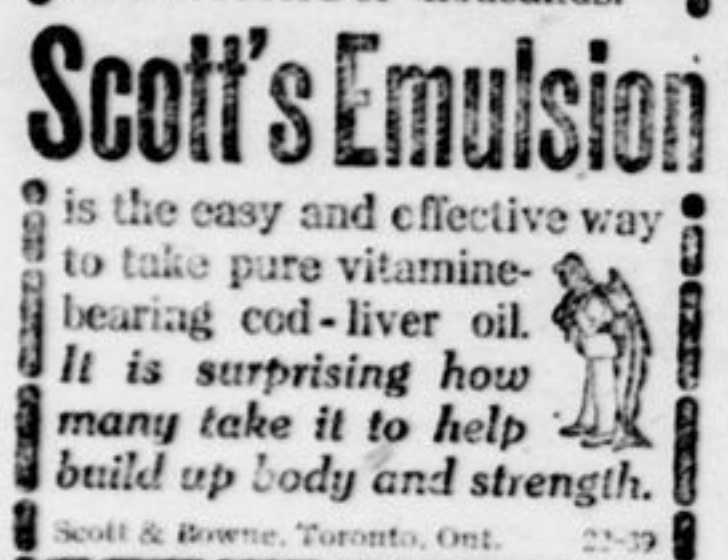

While the merchants have hesitated to voice their grievances, keen resentment is being felt over the competition which the legitimate trade has had to encounter from the innumerable church bazaars this winter.

Judging by the stock displayed at these bazaars, the women's wear dealers are the worst sufferers. The vendor appears to have specialized on clothing, mostly small articles, which are purchased as Christmas gifts.

Each year, it seems, they are becoming more enterprising and pretentious, until now great quantities of goods are being disposed of at the expense of the retailer who pays taxes, rent, salaries and everything else.

Among the women's wear lines which appear to take a popular appeal in this connection are: night gowns,

bloomers, cantosoles, boudoir cape and bungalow dresses. All of these are usually sold in plain and fancy designs. In addition to these children's dresses, underwear and other lines are usually carried in profusion.

The matter is being broached at this time so that the organizations that have in the past conducted these bazaars, have lots of time to consider the other side of the question and if necessary, lay plans to raise money in a different way. It is worth considering.
