Propose Plan to Connect Eugenia with Niagara

Hydro Development at Eugenia can Not Operate to Capacity Owing to Lack of Water.

For some time, engineers of the Ontario Hydro Commission have been working on the problem as to how the growing needs for power on the Eugenia System can best be met. For some time it has been understood that the development at Eugenia Falls is not capable of producing enough energy for a 24-hour capacity service all the year round. Its reserves of water are not sufficient to carry over the dry seasons, and it is doubtful if the peak could be maintained for any considerable length of time.

A meeting of the Eugenia Hydro Association will likely be held in the near future, when a plan will be considered whereby the Eugenia system will be connected with the Niagara system by a power line probably from Harrison to Mt. Forest. A frequency changer would have to be installed at either place.

An extra generator has been installed at Eugenia and it is also probable to build a new pipe line from the dam to the power house, which would double the capacity of the plant for peak load purposes.

If Eugenia and Niagara are connected, it is probable that Niagara power will be used during average hours, but that power from Eugenia will be held for peak load purposes, both on the Eugenia System and on the Severn System. The sale of this power, it is said, would almost pay for the power secured from Niagara.

In linking up with the Niagara system there would be the additional advantage that should any break occur on the Eugenia plant, it would not mean a shut down as the Niagara plant would take care of the load.
