Landslide Sweeps Con. Party into Power in Ontario; Dr. Jamieson Again South Grey's M. P. P. by 313

The result of the voting on Monday in South Grey was a decisive victory for Dr. Jamieson. He has won his greatest victory by defeating the opponent, who four years ago won by 553. The courage that carried him into the contest against such a majority, has been rewarded by victory and we offer him congratulations.

Mr. Leeson made a gallant fight, but his organization, even with the clubs lined up in his favor, was ineffective and country as well as town, showed a decreasing vote for the C. F. O. candidate.

The Province as a whole, has given a substantial majority to the Conservative party, Liberal and U. F. O. taking their place at the foot of the list. Perhaps these two groups will now take a season of thinking and discussion just how much their divisions (seemingly) have similarity of principles) is responsible for their position.

To not a few the disaster that has befallen the U. F. O. will be attributed to Secy J. Morrison who gave but faint support to Mr. Drury, who without doubt was its most enlightened advocate.

Wellington Hay and E. C. Drury were not spared to lead their diminished forces in the new House. The latest estimates we have seen give Liberals 14, Progressives 17, Labor candidates did badly also, only 4 surviving. Of 4 women candidates not one was elected. Sir Adam Beck had a great majority in London and under the friendly auspices of his party in power will likely have his own sweet way in the matter of Hydro and Hydro Radials.

North Grey returned Taylor U. F. O. as member by 60 majority. All returns election night with 1 poll (Peabody) to hear from George Breese, Conservative 112 majority, and his chances looked bright. But when this poll in Sullivan reported (Doug. McKinnon's home poll) its figures were Taylor 186, Dickin 16, Breese 14. Breese was breezed out, the 172 U. F. O. majority in the poll putting him 60 behind. Dickin, Liberal, polled only about half the vote of the other two candidates. Taylor took 1042 votes in Owen Sound city.

Centre Grey will also remain in the U. F. O. column. Hon. Mr. Raney had a majority of 1200, Hon. Mr. Doherty 1000. Biggs in spite of the fierce attacks on his road policy won by hundreds, and so did Bowman of Manitowish. Raney, Doherty, Carmichael, Biggs, Bowman, Nixon, are ministers who escaped defeat. Who will be leader is not known.

Carmichael's majority in East Grey is now 113. Fenton U. F. O. is in North Bruce by 400, South Bruce captured by McCallum U. F. O. and Mawhinney, Liberal retains West Bruce.

The town of Durham rolled up Jamieson's banner majority, 744, which was more than even the Conservatives counted. Splendid organization, abundance of cars, were big factors in rolling up this town's last best vote—844, 114 more than last election. Old and young, Tories and

Disastrous Electrical Storm Monday afternoon last a wind storm of unprecedented severity struck central Ontario south of Fergus, causing damage estimated at \$2,000,000. From the train windows between Elora and Guelph evidence of the loss is seen in uprooted trees, levelled orchards, unroofed barns, two at least apparently levelled to the stone foundations. Worse than all four lives have gone out as a result of injuries of one kind or another.
