J. W. Rombough, now of Charlottetown, P.E.I., while receiving in the Provincial Parliament Buildings from the Premier and Mayor, the welcome and greetings of the city, we were somewhat surprised to hear our name called out and that of the Chronicle Editor, Mr. Irwin. On going forward we were delighted to meet Mr. Rombough, though not previously knowing him. Through the thoughtfulness of Mr. Joe Brown of town, he received Durham papers, accompanying him with our coming visit to his city, and not knowing us personally, took this method of becoming acquainted. Mr. Rombough left Durham in 1893 and since that time has been a world traveller, having crossed the ocean no less than 40 times. For eight years past Mr. and Mrs. Rombough have been living about three miles out of Charlottetown and there have an exceedingly pretty spot. Here he shows his love for Durham, in that he has a flower bed, purely of Durham extraction and from the Rombough hills south of town and over which he religiously attends. Mr. Brown is also responsible for this contribution to his garden. With Mr. Rombough (who was formerly Miss Irwin's pastor here) they made the kindest of visits and it was our regret that our stay could not be lengthened. Mr. Rombough is now interested in fox farming and has 30 pairs of the pure "silver black," winning several prizes at the Toronto Winter Exhibition last December.

Also he is a naturalist and astronomer of no mean order and altogether made our time very pleasant while in this section of "The Garden of the Gulf."

It was in that interesting and quaint old city of Quebec that we were pleased to meet Rev. Dr. Farquharson, former pastor of Durham Presbyterian Church, that we came in touch with our second visitor that gives special color to our trip. To our surprise the Doctor joined our party on leaving Levis for a boat trip down the St. Lawrence, and proved to be a most fortunate surprise, no better guide was possible in locating for us the historic spots in Canadian history annuals, along the rugged shore line as we passed along and under the huge canelever bridge.

After luncheon at the Chateau Frontenac, he again acted in the capacity of guide and from the heights of the citadel, were able to view a wonderful panorama of water hill and dale, and all so bound up in the historical lore of our country. The Doctor appeared to be enjoying the best of health and spirits and wished to be kindly remembered to his many friends in Durham and vicinity. He is looking forward to a visit from Mr. Farquharson and Jessie to the ancestral home in a short time.

As will be understood, the usual trend of travelling in Durham and vicinity, is westward and those who have past associations with Durham, are chiefly to be found there. Hence it was with mutual pleasure that our visit brought Durham to the fore.
