**Presentation to Mr. Catton**  
On the bowling green last Monday night, in the presence of about thirty of the business men of the town, Mr. A. A. Catton was presented by them with a fine gold watch as a recognition of his worth as a citizen while in Durham. Mr. Catton came here about 24 years ago as manager of the Durham Furniture Co., in early days a struggling institution, and in his nearly 20 years here in that capacity, was a big factor in building that Co. up to its present strength. This year he was removed to Toronto, returning last week on a visit. Mayor Dr. Smith introduced the presentation Monday, calling on ex-mayor Thos. **Embarkment Saves Car**  
A serious accident was narrowly averted last Sunday morning, a mile west of Flesherton and about fourteen miles from Durham, when a big Overland car, driven by William Morrison, son of T. J. Morrison, formerly of Edge Hill, suddenly swerved to the side of the road, due to its steering gear running amiss and causing the front wheel to be badly twisted when an effort was made to drive the car on the road. Besides the driver, in the car were his father, three brothers and a sister, who were on their way from their home at Bateau, Ont., near Collingwood, to make a week end visit to Mr. Morrison's sister, Mrs. Henry Simpson, Durham. Fortunately the accident occurred while the car was passing through a cut in a small grade and thus the bank saved what otherwise might have been a nasty accident. With the axle twisted, the car was abandoned and the occupants came on to Durham via another car. Mr. Morrison returned the same evening to the car with expert assistance and discovered the work of some sneak thief who had located his car in the lonely spot. Eight gallons of gasoline and some tools are reported missing. With the car in travelling order, the visitors drove back home on Monday. The driver stated to the Review that he was of the mind that the accident was caused by defective repair work when the car was overhauled this spring.

## The Humble Rocky Trough

(We are sure all readers who have passed the trough over the hill near where the Gartraxse Road crosses the Rocky Saugeen, will appreciate the following sketch by "C. M. C." It sheds a halo round the humble institution as refreshing as a draft from his handy waters to the weary traveler on a summer's day.)  
"A little spring had lost its way  
Amid the grass and fern:  
A passing stranger scooped a well  
Where weary men might turn."  
That little story in rhyme from one of our old readers often recurs to us at sight of the trough on the roadside half-way up the "Rocky" hill. In the leisurely years before democrats and cars became extinct, when common vehicles met or passed each other with cautious courtesy and narrow roads were not necessarily dangerous places, every driver of an honest nag had time to see from the bridge across the Saugeen at the foot of the hill, the stately stone grist mill down the stream to the west and to the east the banks that grew and the piled shet of primitive rock, bare and grey among the green of the woods. There was time as old Moll plodded up the gently winding hill, to see the clear stream that comes purling down the roadside among the straggled rock edges; and ample time to observe that there were a thousand, thousand cool, cheerful little light green ferns growing all up and down the bank on the right; and even then he has time to spare to find that on the left his way was hedged about and sheltered by a guard of a belt of massed cedars. Cedars they were that rose like a young mountain range and that Lebanon might not have despised. They guarded old Moll from the wind from the west as they drew up to the trough for a drink.

The trough was not always there. At first there was only the pipe that came sprawling headfirst down the steep hillside above and emptied into the roadside ditch. Then in winter, when old Moll and old Mac were hitched side by side to a load of ties, their driver hung a pail on the back of his sleigh, and himself walked up the hills. Those who followed him did the same till the snow beside the sleigh track. There was time for mercy in those days. At the spouting pipe, the pail was brought into use to give the horses a drink. If any teamster coming along behind had not been welcome to the use of his fellow teamster's pail. It was the courtesy of comradeship on the cold road.

Later a wise and discerning township council provided them a homely wooden trough that through the years grew worn and moss-covered, just like the old oaken bucket. Into it the pipe growled and choked and spluttered and the little stream carried away the overflow. So the horse and their drink. The teamsters already had had theirs at the Rocky Hotel before they came to the bridge. At one time there was a pipe that ran from the same spring and, passing underneath the rocky hill, supplied the Rocky hotel with good water; a superfluous arrangement, one would think, in those days. Possibly the water was useful for rinsing glasses. But the Rocky hotel has long since fallen into ruins and is now a pile of stones on the Provincial Highway. The teamsters learned to cup their hands and drink with their horses at the trough.

Then the Good Roads system came, and the cedars fell before it. The steam shovel was set to work at hollowing the hills, and the trough was pushed aside; then replaced, rickety and naked looking on trestles that somehow suggest the wooden ones of old. The cedars rest, the contrivances on which the motorists to sweep up and down and there is a substantial cement bridge in place of the crazy old prolonged wooden structure.

There is really no great need for the Rocky trough any more. Motorists who are very thirsty carry wet goods in club bags, so they say (softly). Lumber and logs go trucking to town on heavy trucks. Trucks too trail telephone poles down the Gartraxse, a red hauncher for a dangerous sign on the trailing end. Old Moll and Mac are superannuated. Still, in dreaming idle dreams, an idealist visions a memorial park of hills about the Rocky and extending to the water spots "down by the old mill stream" at Aberdeen. A memorial tablet that could not well disappear in centuries could be carved on some one of the vertical rock banks of the river. And it would seem kind perhaps to remove the poor, old, cement tank there, if indeed it could not be a fountain, and all around in its spray, the little fairy green ferns growing up again.
