

CORDIAL OFFICIAL WELCOME TO PRESIDENT HARDING AT VANCOUVER

Big Military Display Marks the Visit of the Chief Executive of the United States as the Guest of the Dominion.

A despatch from Vancouver says:—More than 40,000 persons heard President Warren G. Harding deliver a message of warm friendship and admiration for Canada. Realizing the significance of the occasion—the first time a holder of his high office has visited Canada—the reception accorded him along the line of march and at Stanley Park, where the address was delivered, was most impressive in its enthusiasm.

The President himself frankly admitted that the welcome far exceeded expectations of himself or his party and declared that he regarded it as a new assurance that the Dominion of Canada and the United States will go along hand-in-hand, side-by-side, toward fulfillment of the destinies of the two great democracies.

The manifestation of welcome were continuous, beginning Thursday morning when the naval transport and his party from Alaska, steamed into Burrard Inlet and received from the British light cruiser Curley a salute of 21 guns, and continuing until 9.30 o'clock at night when, after attending a state dinner given by the Governments of the Dominion and of the Province of British Columbia, Mr. Harding returned to the Henderson for the overnight voyage to Seattle. It was a welcome bespeaking friendship and cordiality not alone for the man himself, but for the great nation he represented.

Declaring that the traditional friendship existing between Canada

and the United States presents an excellent example to other parts of the world, the President said a significant symptom of the growing mutuality of the two countries appeared in the fact that a voluntary exchange of residents, wholly free from restrictions, has been going on. "Our natural and industrial exigencies have made it necessary for us, greatly to our regret to limit immigration. But there is no quota for Canada. We gladly welcome all your sturdy, steady stock who care to come, as a strengthening ingredient and influence."

On the historic moment when the President set foot on Canadian soil the first gun of the 21-gun artillery salute sounded. Escorted by General Victor Odium, the naval officers and members of the United States Cabinet, the President inspected the guard of honor, which on his arrival presented arms, while the band struck up "The Star Spangled Banner."

Some time was taken up with the inspection. The President showed great interest in the officers and men, many of whom wore numerous medals, indicating long and splendid service in the battlefields overseas.

Then the President was escorted back to where Dominion, Provincial and civic authorities presented official addresses of welcome, expressing keen appreciation of the more than a century of peace between the two nations, a keen desire of promoting still more friendly trade relations and admiration for the nation itself and genuine cordiality for the men representing that nation.

Nineteen Years Already Spent on Liverpool Cathedral. Sailor's Love Letter Received By Swedish King.

A despatch from London says:—The Cathedral of Liverpool has reached the halfway stage in its construction this week, nineteen years after the laying of the foundation stone in the largest church ever built in England.

The size of the cathedral when finished will be exceeded only by St. Peter's of Rome, being approximately equal in size to the Cathedral of Seville and larger than that of Milan.

Only three churches of cathedra rank have been built in this country since the dissolution of State and Church.

The Liverpool cathedral will be half as large again as St. Paul's in London, three times as large as the Roman Catholic cathedral in Westminster and five times the area of York. It will dwarf all the medieval churches in the country, exceeding by more than half the area of York Minster, at present the largest church in England.

Designed by Giles Gilbert Scott, a grandson of the famous ecclesiastical architect, Sir Gilbert Scott, when he was only twenty-one years of age, the cathedral is a free interpretation of the fourteenth century Gothic, challenging comparison with the work of the master masons in the Middle Ages. It is situated on the rocky mass of St. James Mount, in the centre of the city, more than 100 feet above the Mersey, and will be the dominating feature of the city, seen by vessels entering port.

The King is expected to be present at the consecration of the choir in July of next year, but it is impossible to forecast when the great cathedral will be finally completed, as it is being built in sections, according to the amount of money available.

Later that day officers in the training ship received the message that by order of the King, Ester's sweetheart was to be given a holiday the following Monday.

Cattle Prices Weakening on English Market

A despatch from London says:—Due to considerable numbers of Canadian store cattle shipped to England in the Spring being placed on the market, as well as English cattle, there has been a steady weakening in prices during the last month. This was accentuated by the hot weather of the last two or three weeks, so that Canadian store and fat cattle which a month ago were selling at sixty-five shillings per 112 pounds or slightly over, sold on Thursday at fifty-five shillings per 112 pounds or even lower.

The demand for land in Ontario by bona-fide settlers shows a marked increase, with the result that it has become necessary to open new areas, according to a report for the year 1922, issued by the Provincial Department of Lands. During the past year 894 persons purchased land, an increase of over 150. In addition, 219 locations of 160 acres each were granted to returned men, or a total of 35,040 acres. Patents were granted covering 43,119 acres to 328 settlers who had met the required building and clearing conditions.

Canada from Coast to Coast

Halifax, N.S.—Figures compiled by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics show that the value of farm property in Nova Scotia has increased by 18 per cent. in ten years from 1911 to 1921. The value of farm property in Nova Scotia in 1921 was \$136,841,593, as against \$115,974,892 in 1911. Farm acreage was 4,728,550 in 1921, as against 5,260,455 acres in 1911, and 5,080,901 acres in 1901.

St. John, N.B.—The Atlantic Pulpwood Co., Ltd., was recently incorporated under the Companies' Act of the Province of New Brunswick, for the purpose of carrying on business in pulpwood and timber lines. The company proposes to handle cargo as well as rail shipment wood, and has its head office in St. John and a branch office at Annapolis Royal.

Montreal, Que.—One hundred and four thousand boys have been bandied into an army of guards to watch for and prevent forest fires in the Dominion this year, according to an announcement made by the Canadian Forestry Association. The new organization, which is known as the Young Canadian's Forest League, will, it is expected, save several million dollars' worth of timber from fire ravages.

Port Arthur, Ont.—Contract for dredging in Port Arthur and Fort William harbors this summer has been awarded to a Midland, Ont., contractor. The Public Works calls for an expenditure on dredging of over \$300,000. Considerable work is to be done around the elevator wharves and new slips are to be dredged out for the Stewart and Bawit elevators.

Saskatchewan Town Fire Loss \$110,800

A despatch from Saskatoon says:—Wynyard, on Thursday morning, following the disastrous fire which wiped out the business section of the town Wednesday night, resembled a shell-wrecked town, the war areas in France. The total loss has been estimated at \$110,800, covered by insurance to a little over \$39,900.

It is understood that the Athabasca Petroleum Products will build a 250-barrel oil refinery at Fort McMurray this summer, for the extraction of petroleum products from the Athabasca tar sands. They are now moving their equipment to Fort McMurray, where they will start operations about September 1.

THE DELINQUENT BOY OR GIRL

BY DR. J. G. SHEPHERD. Since the century began great progress has been made in the care of delinquent children. The aim universally accepted is to keep them from association with criminals in goal or court or penitentiary, to treat them as erring children, and to restore them to rectitude and good citizenship.

The Juvenile Delinquents Act of Canada passed in 1908 states in its preamble that "it is not expedient that youthful offenders should be classed or dealt with as ordinary criminals; the welfare of the community demands that they should on the contrary be guarded against association with crime and criminals, and should be subjected to such wise care, treatment and control as will tend to check their evil tendencies and strengthen their better instincts." Hence the Juvenile Court—not the Police Court, the Detention Home—not the goal, the Industrial School—not the prison or penitentiary are required in terms of this beneficent measure. Children are not born delinquents as many suppose or assume. They become such. And society has much responsibility for this as is shown from a consideration of some of the causes of delinquency. One of the most fruitful of these causes is mental defectiveness. Society could and should prevent the greater part of mental defectiveness by segregating mental defectives and thus preventing the bringing of the mentally defective child into the world. Two-thirds of mental defectiveness is hereditary according to Dr. H. H. Goddard. But in dealing with an unfortunate child born with a mental lack and a consequent moral weakness, it is socially foolish and wrong to treat the child as a criminal. It is entitled to paternal sympathetic treatment. It needs care and training for body, mind and spirit such as it will receive in an industrial class in school or in a school given over to the care of the feeble-minded. Society is, by its neglect, responsible for the birth of two-thirds of these little ones!

Neglect and dependency of children is another fruitful cause of delinquency. Families numbering many thousands are left penniless and dependent through the death or permanent disability of the fathers. The mothers are compelled to go out and earn the necessities of life for themselves and their families. The children, unmothered in the day, get into bad company and bad habits, violate some by-law or statute and thus become delinquents. Others would be better off if they had no parents, said to say, and they more readily become delinquents. Society should provide for such dependent and neglected children by such means as Mothers' Allowances, which is now done in the four Western Provinces and in Ontario.

13,000 Needed to Harvest Alberta's Grain Crop.

About 13,000 men will be required to harvest Alberta's bumper grain crop. At least 3,000, it is anticipated, will be available from Alberta itself, leaving about 10,000 to be brought in from outside points. A campaign to obtain the harvesters is beginning locally and will be prosecuted outside also; and, in fact, is already under way on a fairly large scale.
