Middle School Entrance to Normal and Junior Matriculation Results, Durham High School

In Durham High School 58 Third Form Students wrote on Entrance to Normal, Junior Matriculation or both, and the school has made a good showing. It is difficult to compare with past years, as students take up subjects desired each year, and once passed are through with them. Some have had only 1 or 2 subjects to complete, while others have taken up to 8. Of the 58 writing, 14 were successful in all subjects, 13 failed in only one, 9 failed in two, 8 failed in three, and 14 in more than three subjects. Those failing in a few subjects can write off these exams at supplemental examinations in September and if successful, get a complete certificate. Ancient History slaughtered most.
