Some depositors in our Canadian chartered banks have recently been making enquiries concerning their financial standing. Some have gone farther, and have changed their deposit accounts from one bank to another.

The Globe is assured, on the highest official authority, that the depositors in every chartered bank carrying on business in Ontario today are amply secured, and that there is not the least necessity for concern as to their safety.

The removal of deposits from one bank to another does not necessarily increase their security, and it is understood that the banks themselves, in times like the present, do not favor such action. It only tends still further to disturb and unsettle confidence and sanity are essential.

The Globe hopes its readers will take no part in rocking the boat.

A WORLD CATASTROPHE

An earthquake of unequalled proportions in civilized history has brought death and destruction to a large part of Japan, including its chief cities. Tokio and Yokohama are almost obliterated. Great docks and public buildings, as well as humble dwellings are in ruins or wiped out by fire.

Toronto "Ex." still Expanding

Every year in every way Toronto National Exhibition is becoming bigger and better, until now it is the greatest World's Fair held with permanent buildings. A million and a half attendance, is the objective of its management this year and it bids fair to be obtained.

The displays in the various buildings are as attractive or more so than ever, the horticultural display being especially fine. It is wonderful all that can be seen and heard for 25 cents. The Mexican and Cuban bands were great drawing cards, all splendid musicians.

We were privileged to attend on Press Day last Friday, when the Press men were the guests of the Directors at a luncheon in the Administration Building, following which was a program of inspiring addresses presided over by President Miller of the C. N. E.

Other speakers were T. H. Preston, Brantford, President of the Daily Section; Lorne Eady of Walkerton, Vice Pres. of the Can. Weekly News-papers; Acton Burrows, Toronto and the chief speaker, Sir Adam Beck.

Sir Adam discussed the expansion and development of the Hydro Electric in this Province and stated that in three years—by 1925, all available power in Ontario would be utilized, and where to secure more than, he at present didn't know.

The performance in front of the Grand Stand was ahead, we believe, of past years, the "Cleopatra" spectacle being one of magnificent costuming and setting. Time and space do not permit of detail or mention of other features. Suffice to say the management are looking ahead to next year to have a little more grounds, and a more imposing Eastern entrance erected.
