

Boiling Pins in Beer.

It was not until 1840 that solidheaded pins came into general use. About that time an American named Wright patented a machine which could turn out 160 pins a minute. In the manufacture of modern pins brass wire is used. It is drawn to the required length and pointed by means of a revolving cutter, while the heads are shaped by a die. At this stage the pins are boiled in weak beer to remove grease and other matter. Then they are given a bright silvery appearance by coating them with tin, or "coloring," as it is called.

The most costly pins are those made of very fine hair-like wire; these are used by insect collectors. In the middle ages pins were made



Men Veiled in Sahara Plateau.

It is also a custom of the People of the Vell that the women enjoy great freedom in their love affairs; however, their conduct generally is arreproach-
