Eight Schools Competed at Egremont School Fair

Township wide interest was evidenced at the second annual Egremont School Fair at Holstein last Tuesday, when in spite of threatening rain all day, at times a drizzle, a large crowd gathered at Park and Hall to view the sports and exhibits. The latter were doubled over last year and so was the number of schools competing. In addition to No. 3, (Holstein), No's 10, 11 and 13, which entered last year, four more sections went in.—No's 4, 9, 12 and U. S. S. No. 2 (Orchard).

This provided keen competition in all classes and in potatoes, there were 26 entries. More and better bread than at other fairs, is also reported by the judges. Worthy of special mention were the eight insect collections, the first prize entry of Jean Ellis being especially good.

Egremont Fair was the seventh out of 19 school fairs being held in Grey County, by T. S. Cooper, Dept. of Agriculture representative and his staff. With him were A. W. McKenzie, Assistant Director Ernest Robinson, Physicist, W. B. Orr, M. C. A., who handled the sports, W. B. Orr, assistant; Clare Mercer, judge of Poultry and Eggs; three lady judges, Mrs. T. Tuck, Miss H. Matthews, Markdale; Miss Johnston, Rocklyn; and Miss Saunders, the Secretary. They kept things moving and gayety and children an interesting afternoon.

No 12 Egremont, school was awarded first prize in the parade, judged as to marching, deportment and manner of displaying identity of the school. Holstein school was second, and No. 4 third. A pleasing feature at the Park was the presentation of the Entrance medal to Miss Margaret Arnall for highest at Holstein. Miss Davidson presented it and Mr. W. J. Sharp gave the address. Olive West, daughter of the Parsonage, won a free girls public speaking contest in three original. Irene Plester and Katherine McLean, both No. 11, were 2nd and 3rd, and Don Gardner, also No. 11, was the only boy orator.

Murray Dowling (No. 4) won the boys' driving contest, Ronald McArthur (No. 10) was second and Frank Heany (No. 3) third. Amanda Matthews (No. 12) had the girls' contest all to herself.

Many tight races were pulled off by different ages of school children, badges being awarded as 1st to 6th prizes. The teachers' race was a hummer, with four ladies and two men entered. The latter were handicapped a few yards, which proved undoing for the girls breezed in ahead—Miss Edwards of Holstein Con. School in the lead, with Miss Thaler of Orchard and Miss Davidson, Holstein, almost even with her. A couple race proved amusing, the pair having to hold hands in the race and reaching the mark, the man placed his coat on the girl, buttoned one button and raced back. Miss Edwards and Mr. Orr came in first, Miss Della McEachern and Mr. Alex Calder next.

Special prizes were donated by Miss Davidson, Holstein, and Dromore Institutions, and Mr Geo. Fenton gave a 1st and 2nd to each school, of 4c and 25c worth of scribbles and pencils, to the two pupils taking highest totals of points.

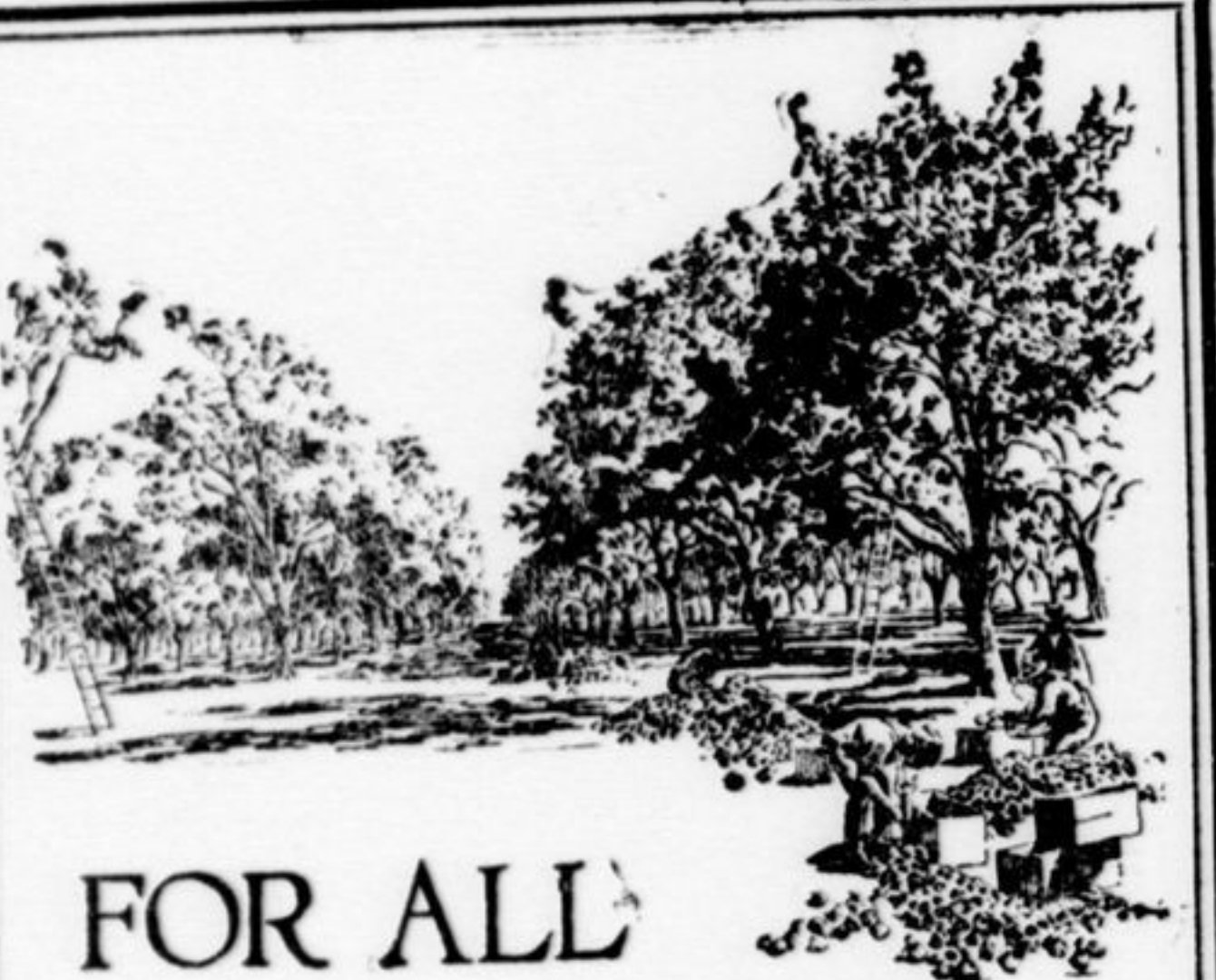
