

Dr. Marsh in Bermuda

A copy of a Bermuda paper, appropriately called "The Mid-Ocean" reached us last week. It gives prominence to a slight earthquake that had shook the islands and sent the Editor and many others to Rev. Dr. Marsh, formerly of Holstein, to ascertain by his seismograph the extent and causes of the quake. Few more competent than Dr. Marsh to give scientific information along these lines. The closing paragraph of an editorial says: "Dr. Marsh in the light of his scientific knowledge, takes a more optimistic view than others in regard to

present disturbances indicating that the last trumpet will soon be heard. He asserts that after an earthquake such as that which recently occurred in Japan, Nature has something which she must get off her chest, and in the absence of some great volcanic eruption, it is possible that quakes will be felt, though not necessarily locally. This morning's cables telling of quakes in Southern Italy, Sicily and Malta support this view."
