Rev. G. H. Thomas Called
At the joint meeting of Flesherston, Eucenia and Proton Station congregations, in Chalmers Church, Flesherston, with Rev. H. Shannon of McIntyre presiding, a call was unanimously mediated in favor of Rev. G. H. Thomas, B. A., B. D. of Toronto. It is expected the call will be dealt with soon at a special meeting of Orangeville Presbytery.

To Plot Holders of Durham Cemetery

The beautiful appearance of our cemetery is largely due to having a permanent caretaker and unless all respond this system cannot be carried on. We trust that all parties who have overlooked the important matter will respond as soon as possible.

Canada's Youngest V. C. to receive Aid
Tommy Holmes, Grace City, as well as Canada's youngest V. C., and a native of Owen Sound, is again in the limelight, due to the fact that it is discovered he has the tuberculosis germ, and if this germ was contracted on the field of battle or otherwise, is the question now being debated. However, even were it not it is a case where Government aid should be given this war hero and his case is receiving special consideration from Hon. H. S. Beland Minister of Soldiers Civil Re-establishment.

Appointed Moderator of Synod
Honors have been bestowed upon Rev. J. A. Matheson of Mono Road, in Orangeville Presbytery and former Moderator of Kingston at the Synod of Toronto and at the Synod being held this week in St. James' Square Church, Toronto. Only two members were nominated for the Moderator's chair, Rev. J. A. Matheson and Rev. Dr. Turnbull of High Park Presbyterian Church, Toronto. Rather than have a vote on the question, Rev. Dr. Turnbull withdrew, in order, as he expressed it, that the election of the new Moderator might be by the unanimous vote of the Synod.

October Women's Institute
The October meeting of the Women's Institute was held at the home of Mrs. A. Ritchie on Thursday last. The attendance was much smaller than usual and as the program tended to be exceptionally good this is to be regretted. Mrs. (Rev.) Peterger gave a splendid paper on "How can we intercede with Digestion." a copy of which will appear elsewhere in this issue. Miss Margaret McGirr explained very fully the Workmen's Compensation Act and the Mothers' Allowance Act. Having gone to some considerable trouble in ascertaining facts and figures, Her talk was worthy of a much larger audience. Mrs. Sherk, President, was appointed to attend the Provincial Convention in Toronto in November.

Central Hotel Searched
Last Saturday night County Constables Falconer and Watson made a search of the Central Hotel and found two bottles and two jugs of liquor, alleged to be stronger than allowed by law, in a recess beneath the kitchen floor. One bottle was sent to Toronto for analysis. The same Constables and Inspector Beckett and Con. Jones of Owen Sound, had visited the hotel three weeks ago, but found no strong stuff on that occasion.

High-class Concert by blind Artists.
The Baptist Young People of Durham take pleasure in announcing that Miss Gretta Lammie, violinist, Miss Katharine Sells, elocutionist, and Miss Gladys Slay, pianist and soloist, who are all graduates of the Ontario School for the Blind, will give one of their programs in the Town Hall, on Tuesday, October 16th. Admission, 25c, children under 12, 15c. This program is not being put on for any financial benefit that may accrue, but rather to give an opportunity to see the results of the work of the Ontario School for the Blind.

Claiming \$40,000 Damages
On behalf of herself and her four children, the oldest seven year old, and the youngest born two and a half months after his father's death, Mrs. Lillian Semple has entered action against the Canadian National Railway to recover \$40,000 damages for her husband's death. He was killed in a level crossing accident at Varney on June 15th last and was engaged at that time and at that place as engineer on a steam shovel. The defence alleges that the automobile approached the crossing without reasonable precaution. The case is ready for trial at the October sittings in Toronto.

Death of Mrs Geo. Ritchie
There passed away in Acton on Monday morning, Oct. 8th, Mrs. Geo. Ritchie, after many years of illness and suffering. Her husband, who survives, is a well known member of the Ritchie family of S. Grey, but for many years now a resident of that village. Deceased's maiden name was Mary McLean and after her marriage to Mr Ritchie, lived for some years on the 2nd con. Bentinck, somewhere near the present locality of Mr And. Pickett's farm, and here some of their family were born. She leaves besides her husband to mourn her demise, four sons, William, Dan, George and Herbert, all but Herbert being married and living in Acton. The sons Dan and Herbert served overseas at present the former is in charge of a soldier's home in Acton. Also one daughter was born of the marriage, Mrs. Elliott, but she passed away some time ago.

Large Audiences Hear J. J. Maloney
At both regular services in the Baptist Church Sunday the church was thronged to hear Mr J. J. Maloney, the eloquent young speaker who over a year ago, broke away from the Roman Catholic faith, and this fall is beginning a course for the Presbyterian ministry. At evening service the church was filled by 6.30 p.m., those coming over five minutes later could not gain admittance and scores were turned away.
At the afternoon meeting for men only, the situation was somewhat similar. Four to five hundred men filled every available seat, with many standing and some turned away. Men were present from Hanover, Neustadt, Ayton, Pricerville, Collingwood and many from the surrounding country, while visitors from Owen Sound and Walkerton as well attended the other services.
Mr Maloney in all three discourses impressed upon his hearers that he had no quarrel with the Roman Catholic people—some of the finest people of the land were of that faith, but it was upon some of the doctrines of the church that he based his criticism and explained why he could not believe in them. He maintained that he feared no man, and would earnestly proclaim the gospel of Christ and the story of His life and death for mankind—"the sweetest story ever told." For over an hour at morning and evening services Mr. Maloney

spoke earnestly and convincingly, holding rapt attention. His discourse to the men held their interest over two hours, also with the best of attention and but one short intermission. He urged upon them the living of clean and upright lives, in accordance with Nature's laws and to be actively connected with a Protestant church.
