Saw Mill Mysteriously Burned

Between four and five o'clock last Sunday morning, Mr. Arch. McArthur's sawmill on the 2nd con, Glenelg, 1 1/2 miles east of Dornoch, was burned to the ground. No other cause is apparent but incendiarism, as the mill had not been in operation for over two months. Mr. McArthur used a threshing engine for power, and in recent weeks has had it in use threshing, so fortunately it was not there to be destroyed. It was a building perhaps 25 ft by 40 ft, and was in flames when the owner, who lives nearby, first noticed it. There was some insurance, but the loss will still be a serious one.

Foresters Raise Rates

The Canadian Order of Foresters has issued a bulletin giving notice of a sharp increase in insurance rates to take effect on Jan. 1st. It has long been known that an increase was coming, in fact was inevitable—but the big boost has nearly taken the wind out of some of the members. Those who joined since August 1918, will not be called upon to pay the increase but those who became members before that time, will have their rates increased by their rates. Increased rates will have their rates increased very materially, according to their age and years of membership. For instance a man who joined in 1893 at the age of 21 years at 60c per month, will now be called upon to pay \$2.19 per month and court dues besides. The unfortunate feature of the increase is that those who have paid in for the largest period are raised to a rate that is almost prohibitive and are now unable to secure insurance protection in any other company.

Pricerville and Sw. Park Call Rev. Geo. I. Craw, B. A.

A unanimous call was extended to Rev. George I. Craw, B. A., of Springville, near Peterborough, by Pricerville and Swinton Park Presbyterian congregations, at a well attended meeting held in St. Columba Church, Pricerville on Tuesday afternoon. Rev. G. W. Rose, B. A., Corbetton, the Moderator, presided at the gathering. Five ministers were voted for, a Rev. Mr. Fee being in second place, but as Rev. Craw had a good majority, the congregations unanimously made him their choice as pastor. He has had a successful pastorate of fifteen years in Springville and Lakevale, and it is thought likely he will accept the call. Next Thursday, Nov. 29th, the induction of Rev. Mr. Harrower as pastor of Fisherton Presbyterian church, takes place. If Rev. Mr. Craw accepts it will be definitely known at that time, and induction services can then be arranged.

Durham Baptists Call Pastor

The Baptist congregation of Durham and Glenelg Church have extended a hearty and unanimous call to Mr. Jas. Taylor, student at McMaster University, to become their pastor. Mr. Taylor will preach his first sermons to his new congregations, Sunday, Dec. 2nd, but will return the beginning of each week to McMaster University, where he expects to graduate in May of 1924.

Mr. Taylor has spoken to the Baptist congregations here for three or four Sundays, is a fluent and forceful speaker and is likely spoken of by the professors at McMaster University.

The topic for the morning service on Dec. 2nd will be "A Preacher's Resolve" and that of the evening, "The essentials of Service."

bates and the winning organization in that township select the debaters in the inter-township contests. Rules may be had from the Secretary, at Markdale and all entries should be in his hands not later than Jan. 5th, 1924, if the organization is to be a success during the coming winter.
