Town Council had Busy Night

Mayor, Reeve and Councillors were all present on Monday night and got through considerable work. An observer cannot fail to be impressed with the responsibility thrust upon them and the evident desire of all to do justice to the question before them. As usual a number of accounts were disposed of in the usual way.

A petition was presented asking for a street light at the railway crossing near Rob Roy Mills, which has long been observed as a dark corner. It was left with the Fire and Light Com.

Much talk and worry is caused by the non-payment of taxes on property sold by W. E. Clark to Mr Wm. Bailey and resold by him to Thos. Scarf. It is a knotty question and it is to be hoped a satisfactory solution will be found. In any case the Scarf purchase is protected.

The Library grant for the quarter, also the arrears for the last quarter, were passed.

A grant of \$1500 is due the town from County Council but a regulation requires that the work must be done on County Roads—and paid for—before the grant is made. Not quite this amount has yet been spent and paid for but it will be no great trouble to see this done.

Councillor Murdock had got an offer of \$300 for a machine in the Jackson property, and Councillor Saunders charged the town was out hundred dollars if that was its value, for the sum paid by the town to lift the lieue was nearly \$1100. In rebuttal it was claimed that the lieue covered all the machinery. Steps are to be taken to ascertain the real value of the machine and if the offer proves to be reasonable, accept it.

Dr Hutton, Medical Officer of Health, was present at the Town Council on Monday night and intimated to the fathers that his official report would be placed before them at their next meeting. He then entered on a speech which taken verbatim would have made good reading. Touching on the cry "we cannot afford waterworks" he gave a resume of conditions of the town since days of darkness, when we could not afford electric light! Yet we got it, bought out the old company and took new obligations with Hydro and got through, built a new High School, gave loans to the Furniture Company, built bridges and in other ways showed a vitality that should us to still further advance the interest of the town. It was the most optimistic "few remarks" we have heard for some time.

A cheque for \$3600 was passed in favour of the County Treasurer for the County Rate of the Town of Durham.

Curry—McQueen: That Mr Harding be authorized to perform without further delay the agreement entered into with the Property Com., namely to properly clean up the interior and properly grease and oil the machinery to prevent rust in the factory formerly owned by the Jackson Manufacturing Co. and that the Clerk be authorized to collect the balance of rent owing by him to Dec. 31st next, subject to the adjustment of Mr. Harding's account.
