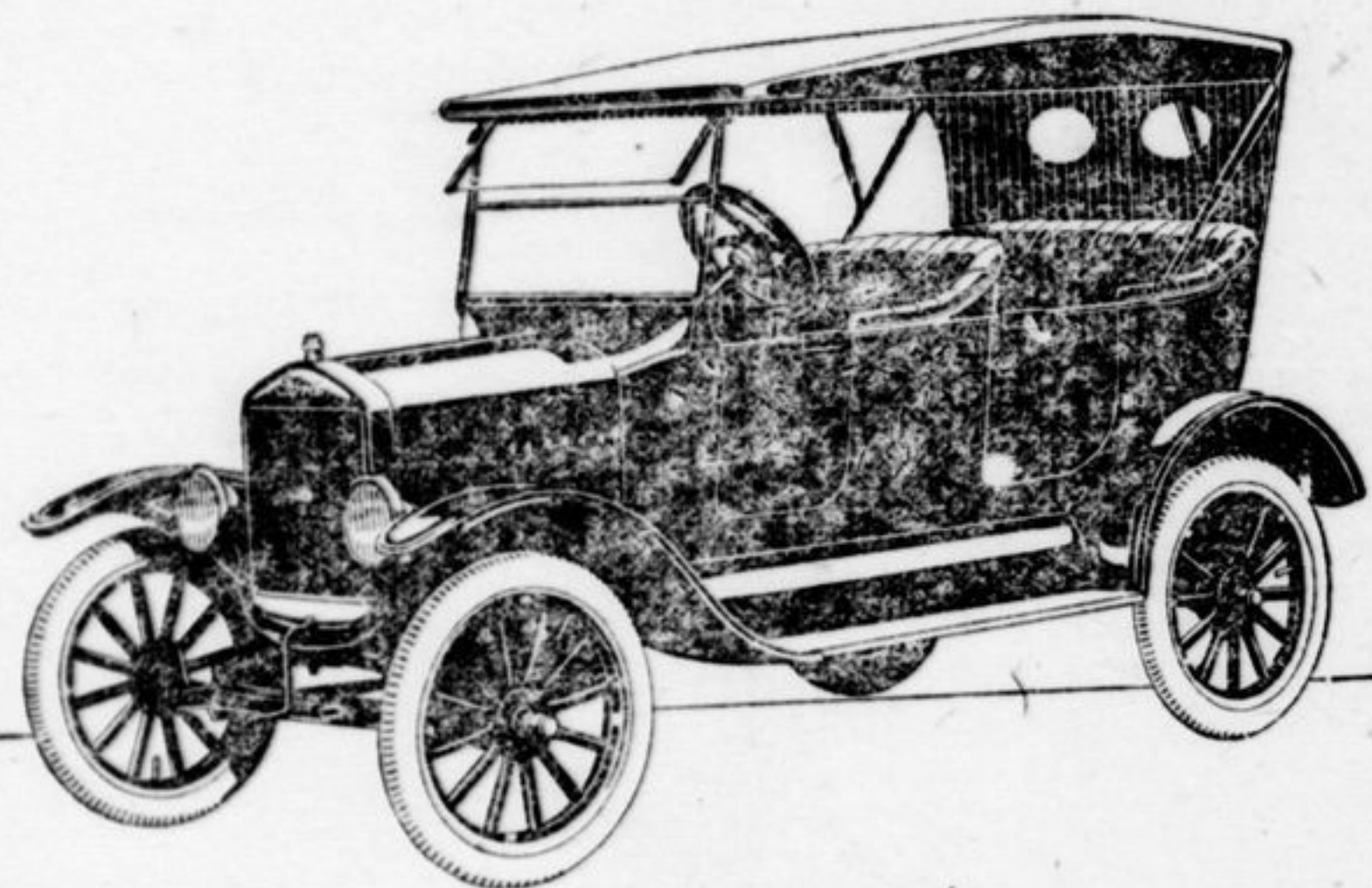

ence in the future and of greater progress than ever were commonly heard.

W. A. Amos, last year's President, was re-elected to the position by acclamation. So was Mr. Harold Currie of Strathroy to the Vice Presidency and at a later meeting M. J. J. Morrison will be elected Secretary.

Eight names were proposed for the Presidency, among them being Miss Agnes McPhail, but all retired in favor of Mr. Amos. Miss McPhail said she had no intention of standing as the work she was now trying to do for the farmers "takes more of my time and more ability than I possess."

THE CONVENTION had its tense moments too. For instance when someone accused J. J. Morrison of acting with the outside press in trying to split the organization.

AND WHEREAS an occupational organization we should be in a position at all times to appeal or to criticize any Government which may be in power on matters affecting our industry or the common good.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the United Farmers' Organization of Ontario take no political action as a party, but confine itself to the aims and objects laid down in its constitution.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT since the full attainment of our aspirations and ideals, we do not oppose the formation of a political party which shall embody these principles.

Above is the most famous and important of the many resolutions passed at the great meeting of the U. F. O. last week. The first four paragraphs make it clear that the U. F. O. is eschewing politics and we are starting to read the last paragraph is necessary to the full attainment of our aspirations and ideals.

The apparent contradiction vanishes at second thoughts as we notice that a political party which shall embody the U. F. O. principles will have no opposition to be separate and distinct: if it succeeds it will have the glory—if it fails the disgrace.

We are assured this resolution took hours in committee and discussion to get whipped into shape to meet varying views. It was endorsed by ex-Premier Drury and by Sec'y J. J. Morrison so small wonder that it passed almost unanimously, less than a score voting against it.

A meeting is to be held on January 3rd in Toronto to bring to birth this new party. Members of the Progressive party in the Dominion as well as in the local houses together with the defeated candidates in last election, are to be present. It is almost certain E. C. Drury will be chosen as leader of the new party, for the warmth of his reception last week indicates clearly that he is the outstanding figure in the new movement.

A spirit of harmony and good will marked the meetings. Mr. Drury and Mr. Morrison, if they ever had differences, smoothed them over by compromises and expressions of con-

BY-LAW NO. 784

OF THE TOWN OF DURHAM

A By-law of the Municipal Corporation of the Town of Durham, to authorize the erection and construction of a waterworks system for the Town of Durham, and to acquire the necessary land and existing water rights, together with the plant, machinery and equipment therefor and to issue Debentures of the said Town for \$44,000.00 for such purpose.

WHEREAS the said Town of Durham is desirous of constructing a waterworks system in the said Town under the authority of the Municipal Act, the Municipal Waterworks Act, and the Public Utilities Act and amendments thereto.

AND WHEREAS in the opinion of the Council of the said Municipality, it is necessary and expedient to provide for the citizens of the said Town water for drinking purposes and other domestic use, and for fire protection; and to install a pumping station, collecting gallery, pumps, elevation tank, machinery and equipment in accordance with the report of Messrs. James, Proctor and Redfern, Limited, at an estimated cost of forty-four thousand dollars (\$44,000) which sum it is necessary to raise on the credit of the said Municipality for the purposes aforesaid.

AND WHEREAS application has been made to the Provincial Board of Health pursuant to the Public Health Act for the approval of the said works, and the said Provincial Board of Health has approved of same.

AND WHEREAS the sum of Forty thousand Dollars (\$44,000) is the amount of the debt intended to be created by this by-law.

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to issue the said debentures at one time and to make the said debt payable in yearly sums during the period of thirty years, being the currency of the said debentures, the said yearly sums being of such respective amounts that the aggregate amount payable in each year for principal and interest in respect of the said debt shall be as nearly as possible equal in each of the twenty-nine years of the said period.

AND WHEREAS the total amount required to be raised annually by special rate for paying the said debt and interest as hereinafter provided is \$3196.55.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the said Town according to the last revised assessment roll is \$567,530.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the existing debt of the said Municipality, exclusive of local improvement debt and school tax is the sum of \$111,182 and no part of the principal and interest is in arrears.

Therefore the Municipal Corporation of the Town of Durham enacts as follows: 1. It shall be lawful for the said Town of Durham to construct the said waterworks system in the said Town, and to install a pumping station, collecting gallery, pumps, elevation tank, plant, machinery and equipment therefor, to be done in accordance with report of Messrs. James, Proctor and Redfern, Limited on file in the Town Clerk's Office.

2. That for the purposes aforesaid, it shall be lawful for the mayor and Treasurer of the said Town to borrow the said sum of \$44,000 and to issue debentures of the said Municipality therefor, which debentures shall be dated on the day of the issue thereof and shall be repayable in thirty years after at the Standard Bank of Canada, at the said Town of Durham.

3. The said debentures shall be payable in thirty annual instalments during the thirty years next after the issue thereof and the respective amounts of principal and interest, payable during each of the said years shall be as follows:

4. Each of the said debentures shall be signed by the Mayor of the said Town, or by some other person authorized by By-law to sign the same, and by the Town Treasurer. The Clerk shall seal same with the seal of the said Corporation.

5. The said debentures shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum payable yearly at the Standard Bank of Canada at the Town of Durham, and shall have attached thereto coupons signed by the Mayor and Treasurer of said Municipality for payment of same.

6. During the currency of the said debentures there shall be raised annually by special rate on all the rateable property in the said Town of Durham, the sum of \$3196.55 for the

purpose of paying the amount due in each of the said years for principal and interest in respect of the said debt.

7. This By-law shall take effect when and come into operation if the said Municipality who are entitled to vote thereon has been obtained thereto and this By-law shall have been filed by the Council of the said Municipality.

8. The votes of the Electors of the said Municipality shall be taken on this question on the Seventh day of the month of January in the forenoon and hour of 9 o'clock in the afternoon continuing to 5 o'clock in the afternoon at the following places and by the Deputy Returning Officers and the Poll Clerks, that is to say:

NORTH WARD at the Public Library with Clifford Elvins as Deputy Returning Officer and Ed. McQueen as Poll Clerk.

EAST WARD at rear of McBeth's Drug Store with J. L. Stedman as Deputy Returning Officer and Arthur McClockie as Poll Clerk.

WEST WARD at the town hall with John Smith as Deputy Returning Officer and Alfred Redford as Poll Clerk.

9. On the 5th day of January, 1924, at the Town Clerk's Office in the said town at 12 o'clock noon, the Mayor will attend to appoint in writing, signed by him, the persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk of said Corporations and one person to attend at the passing of this By-law and a like number in behalf of persons interested in and opposed to the passing of this By-law.

10. The Clerk of the said town will attend at his office in the said Town on Wednesday, the 9th day of January, 1924, at 12 o'clock noon to sum up the number of votes given for and against this By-law.
