Lively Contest in Bentinck

and taking the assessment in the fall. The late Reeve, Mr Hunt, made a good presentation of his regime in a fifty minute address. He appreciated a 2nd term acclamation last year as he likely would have gone down in a contest. Bentinck's health had not been good, with several contagious outbreaks. The Township was prospering as much as any other in Grey, and had been blessed with many good municipal officers in six years service—all out for economy.

All bridge work had been completed—first class jobs. One sink hole had cost about \$700 to fill and a cement culvert was built south of Crawford. No Gov't aid was forthcoming for bridges. He believed in commuting Statute Labor.

Speaking of his county council work Mr Hunt stated that he had secured a bridge on townline each year—a cement one at Hewitson's and at Camp's creek, south of Durham. Practically alone he had opposed raising the Co. Clerk's salary to \$1500. Bentinck had paid \$7,200 to the County for road expenses and received \$21,069.75 in return. He believed in keeping the Co. outfit working on the Durham Road as the Gov't paid 40 per cent of cost and they had the best foreman in the County. For township roads the Gov't paid 20 per cent. Last year this amounted to \$2453.09. This year Treas. Haast estimates grant about \$1043.

County rates will be equalized next year, said the late Reeve and he's after the towns with a big stick. Hanover is three times as valuable as 20 years ago. Its rate should be at least doubled. Bentinck should be doubled also. He denied charges, with proof, that he had held up men's pay sheets, that he had uttered falsehoods on platform, and held it a right that Reeve should have a free hand. He asked for renewal of confidence for another year, would not canvass, or ask a vote.

After two years in council, Mr D. J. McDonald is aspiring for the Reeve's chair this time, and delivered a very fair speech. As Coun. for No. 4 Div., he first gave a resume of his work. The 8th con. sinkhole cost only \$73 this year, whereas the average for the last 6 years was \$250. Light graders were not used as much as they should be. More bridges must yet be built but not now with building costs high; a fixed bridge policy should be adopted, levying an equal yearly rate. He opposed commuting statute labor; "we should not change unless by vote of the people." He favored reducing salaries and did so, cutting out council mileage. No man should hold office year after year; he was now a reeve ship candidate and solicited hearty support.

Robt. Grierson had been satisfied with defeat before, but didn't want it this time, running for Dep. Reeve. "What happened the gravel pits in the north?" No reason for ploughing thru mud holes" interrupted E. Goldsmith. In a little heated debate Mr Grierson possible with and done all road work in a week, but had no apologies to make and was again in the field.

Ed. Rehkopf announced his retirement because of poor health and thanked his home poll for giving him every vote last year.

Henry Metcalfe had topped the poll in five elections but it would be folly to "butt" in now. Bentinck, he said, should send Reeve Hunt back and give him a chance for Co. Warden. He had the ability and Bentinck has had no Warden for 25 years.

Jas. Hewitson thought statute labor should be commuted, like Sullivan, but put it to vote of ratepayers. "With three year's experience," he remarked, "I ask you to elect me as Deputy Reeve; if not perhaps the Lord has something better."

Chas. Bailey was in the Council race and wanted one and all to vote for him.

Joe Hudson was not present, for was Jno. Sachs. Both stand, for Henry Schultz was in the field, also Jno. Weidendorf.

Jas. Turnbull gave a racy address, mainly on road questions. He was then in the race but has since withdrawn.

Eric Goldsmith had been a fighting man overseas and made a fighting speech. He was still ploughing thru mud holes, was paying business tax on his mill and losing business through deplorable roads. He asked all to back him for the Council to endeavor to better conditions.

Replies to points brought up were made by both reeve ship candidates. Mr Hunt chiefly commented on salary increases asked for and granted to County officials, gaoler, turnkey and Warden, at O. Sound, and if rejected, will put all Co. salaries in one by-law for reduction. Five p.m. and the "doings" were over.
