TWENTY YEARS OF FLYING

Twenty years ago December last, the Wright Bros., Orville and Wilbur, made their epoch making flight in the first mechanically driven aeroplane.

They used a propeller to drive their plane. Probably got the idea from ship propeller used in water, just as Lomer Gouin, Minister of Justice, was forced to tender his resignation from the same cause, came as a kind of a bombshell in political circles. However before these two take office it is almost a certainty that some definite assurance will have to be given by Premier King and his cabinet, that the views of the Progressives will be acceded to on the few points on which they differ.

Hence many eyes will be turned towards Ottawa while reconstruction of the Cabinet goes on. Mr Gouin's successor as Minister of Justice is likely to be Hon. Ernest Lapointe.
