In collecting the names it is not safe to accept every answer to an inquiry as being useful to your purpose; because some of the names may be only the expression of personal fancies. "I don't know just what the right name is," but I call it so-and-so." If others conversant with plants in the same neighborhood recognize the name when they hear it you can know that you have a true folk name.

In the record enter the scientific name, the popular name, the neighborhood where it bears that name and the reason why it bears it-if you can discover the reason.
