

The theory is often advanced that have been erected to warn the ap- Canada is likely to become the leading mineral-producing country of the world, and considerable ground for this assumption is found in the fact that the Dominion contains 16 per of the world's known coal resources, has greater asbestos, nickel. and cobalt deposits than any other country, and ranks third in the production of gold, whilst the diversity of her mineral endowment is indicated by the fact that the three main divisions, metallic, non-metallic, and structural and clay products, include some 60 principal items, 17 of which had, in 1923, a production value of \$1,000,000 or over.

Average Annual Five-Year Value.

Figures of total production fail to convey the proper impression of the magnitude of the industry on account of the diversity of product and units involved, whilst the varying prices attendant upon uctuating market conditions make computations of value difficult. Probably the fairest conception of the value of the output may be arrived at by stating that the lowest value since 1910 was that for 1911, viz., \$103,221,000, the highest that for 1920 when a value of \$227,860,000 was reached, while the average annual value during the last five-year period amounted to \$194,957,000. As commodity prices reached a peak in 1920. and have since receded, production computed in terms of value is not a fair basis for comparison. A weighted index showing the volume of production would undoubtedly mark 1923 as the banner year in Canada's mineral industry, new output records being established in that year for coal, lead. zinc, asbestos, and for the vallue of

The principal uses of power in mining are for compressing air for drilling; driving motors or engines for hoisting; haulage of ore above and below ground; driving ore crushers and CANADA FOUNDRIES conveyors; pumping for water supply and for the removal of ground water; lighting; heating; ventilating; signalling; machine; blacksmith and framing shops; and for various electricat metallurgical processes. Even in the comparatively simple toining process. es involved in the recovery of coal, as much as 10 per cent, of the product may be consumed in generating the power required.

Total Installation for Mining Purposes.

From estimates made by the Do-MI// PROCKVILLE ONT. S minion Water Power Branch it is computed that at January 1st, 1924, the hydraulic installation for mining purposes in Canada had reached a total of 277,600 h.p., of which 233,000 h.p. is purchased from central electric stations. An conservative estimate of the capital investment necessary to develop this power is \$74,000,000

From the point of view of minerals and the development of mining, Canada may be divided into five main areas, the Maritime Provinces, Quebec. Ontario, the Prairie Provinces. and British Columbia and the Yukon Each of these areas possesses large resources of water power developed or available for development for mining. With the exception of some of the coal fields of the Central Plain there is no mineralized area for which ample power cannot be made available. This is particularly the case in Ontario and Quebec, which, being situated in the acute fuel area of Canada, would be almost entirely dependent upon coal imported from the United States were it not for hydraulic power. Available and Developed Power.

The department's latest table of available and developed water power in Canada, corrected to February 1st, shows a total available 24-hour power. at 80 per cent. efficiency, of 18,225,316 h.p. at ordinary minimum flow, and 32,075,998 h.p. at ordinary six months' flow, and a total turbine installation in Canada of 3,226,414 h.p. Reference to the table shows the fortunate distribution of water power throughout Canada. The two provinces without native coal, Ontario and Quebec, lead in the possession and utilization of water power, followed closely by Manitoba, where only lignite coal is found. So far as information is available, there
