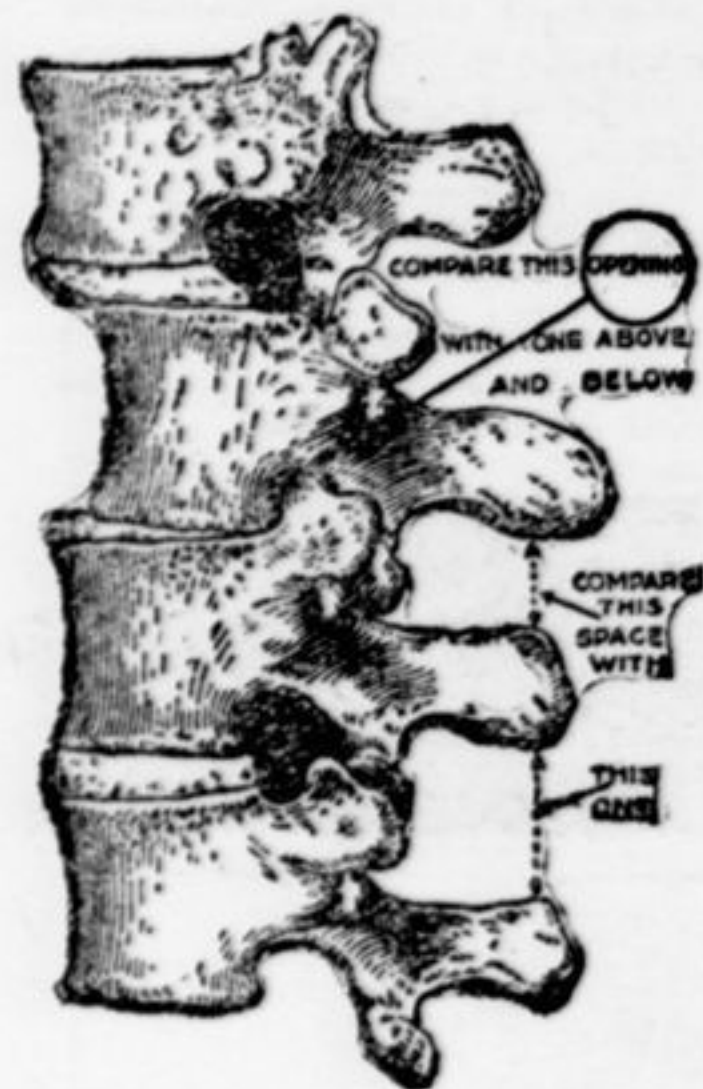


Chiropractic Principles

Six Schools Competed at Glenelg School Fair

No. 10, G. & E. Wagon Parade, No. 3 led in Exhibits.
At Edge Hill School Monday, Glenelg's most successful School Fair was held, the building being filled with scholars from six schools along with their elders, and a splendid class of exhibits.
The schools taking an active part in exhibits were:
No. 3—Edge Hill
No. 5—Zion
No. 9—Ritchie's
U. No. 10, G. & E.—Top Cliffe
Sep. No. 5—East Glenelg
U. No. 3, B. & G.—Latona
All of these except Latona entered the parade, each school being attired in distinctive costume and carrying a banner to denote its identity. It was a most interesting sight to witness the largest gathering of children in Glenelg marching in their varied and pretty costumes. No. 10 School was awarded first prize in parade, No. 2 second and No. 9 third.
First in the day's events was the public speaking contest—a five minute speech on "How we are Governed" for a \$1 prize given by Miss McPhail, M. P. Points were given for department, delivery, material, clearness and pronunciation, and deducted for errors. Anna McEachern of No. 10, was awarded the prize and will be required to compete at Fleshtown on Oct. 18th, against other Township winners for a free trip to Ottawa. Others who contested the prize were Dan Firth, of No. 3, Dorothy Ritchie, No. 3 and Mary Proudly of No. 10.
There was keen competition among the pupils in wheelbarrow races, etc. and in foot races for different ages. Then the grown ups got into the game when Edge Hill section demonstrated their possession of the speediest sprinters in the Township. In the Teachers' race, Miss Armetta McKechnie of No. 3 finished first, Miss Marietta Park of No. 9 second, Miss Richmond U. No. 3 third, Miss E. J. Allan, No. 5, fourth. W. J. Ritchie of No. 3, won the School Secy's race, followed by Coun. Alex Aljoe of No. 9. Vic. Williams of No. 3 was first in the trustees' race, Fred Staples No. 3 second; D. Ryan, Sep. No. 5, third. The married ladies' race finished in the following order: Mrs. T. Glenross, Mrs. W. J. Greenwood, Mrs. W. G. Firth, Mrs. Vasey. W. Lawrence, No. 9 and Vic. Williams, No. 3, came in a tie in the married men's race, closely followed by W. J. Greenwood, No. 5.
No. 3 (Edge Hill) school won most prize money for exhibits—\$15.60; No. 9 won \$14.40; Sep. No. 5 nearly \$14; No. 10 between \$8 and \$9 and No. 5, a small school, did well with \$7.70. Miss McGarry, teacher, and pupils of Sep. No. 5, are worthy of special mention for the ability shown in map drawing, insect and weed collections, and sewing. In the first two classes, they won many of the best prizes, but in sewing (Miss McGarry's own special) they swept everything. No. 10 school also excelled in map drawing. No. 9 in writing and No. 3 was strong in vegetable and egg prizes.
Mr. T. Stewart Cooper, Ag. representative, Markdale, and his staff, managed the day's events excellently, and in these annual fairs, a comparative recent innovation, are doing a splendid work and pastime for the youth of the County. The parents enjoy it as well also, or better than the fall fairs.
