The community has been saddened by the deaths of two little girls, Mary and Blanche Daily, daughters of Mr. Thos. Daily, from scarlet fever. One of the other children took it first and was nearly better when Mary, a sweet little girl of 10 years, was taken down and died in a few days, on Dec. 21st. Shortly afterwards Blanche aged 17, who has been an invalid nearly all her life, took sick and died on Jan. 3rd. Both were buried in Amos cemetery where a short service was held at the grave by Rev. Mr. Burnett and was attended by a number of the friends and neighbors.

Such a bereavement is sad at any time but in a case like this where owing to fear of contagion, the family have to be so sorrow practically alone, it seems much worse and the feelings and sympathy of the community have rarely been touched to a greater extent. Several of the other children have been sick but are all on the way to health again.
