Premier's Plan to Divide University Course Criticized

High discussion is arising in school and university circles at present, over the statements that Premier Ferguson has recently been making. Premier Ferguson's proposal is to give the first two years of a University course in the Collegiate Institutes of the Province, thus not only shortening the University term, but also aiding the local Collegiate or High School, by keeping their bright youth at home.

ially in solving the expense end of a University course, which is a great drawback to ambitious students.

But on the other hand it also has its disadvantages as Dr. Bruce Taylor, Principal of Queen's University, Kingston, points out. "Premier Ferguson's proposal is open to serious objection," he says. "There are too few instructors in the Collegiate Institute who are capable of teaching these advanced classes. The Collegiate Institutes have inadequate equipment, particularly for courses in physics and chemistry and the expense of obtaining the necessary equipment would be almost prohibitive. Moreover it seems to me to be a good thing to get a boy into the university when he is about the age of eighteen."

Dr. Taylor also said he believed that a person of this age who has matriculated, has received enough instruction by the methods which are in use in Collegiate Institutes. After that he should be in the type of environment furnished by the universities.

COUNTY EQUALIZATION ACCOMPLISHED

Elsewhere we give the list of municipalities in Grey Co. and attached are the sums which form the basis of County taxation, adopted at last session of County Council. The expedition in getting this thing through without the appointment of a committee to roam over the Townships as was done twenty one years ago is most commendable and must save a lot of expense.

The matter was referred to the Finance Com. at the suggestion of Reeve McDonald of Bentinck we believe, and that body appointed a sub-committee of four with Reeve Calder as Chairman. The selection of these four has a touch of romance in it, for the Reeves of Keppel, Collingwood, Proton and Normandy were chosen. The four as will be seen, represent the four corners of the County. We don't know who made this suggestion, but it was a good one and left Mr Calder to represent the urban municipalities, something he is quite capable of doing. The work of this committee of five is seen in the list published elsewhere and was, with a few exceptions accepted by the Council as satisfactory. A good day's work.

Mr Calder at Town Council meeting gave a review of the work done at Owen Sound. His fellow County Councillors give him credit for the ability which placed him at the head of the important Finance Committee. The new assessment figures are published on page 5, and are an average increase of about 18 per cent. in the whole County. Durham's increase was \$7,000 or scarcely the 18 per cent. Bentinck was increased \$160,000 or barely 9 per cent. Egremont's raise was \$240,000, Glenelg's \$200,000, Normandy \$200,000, all very reasonable. Proton, Ephraisa and Sullivan each with \$400,000 increase, got larger boosts, and Sydenham was highest of all with \$155,000. Hanover was increased \$175,000, Meaford \$100,000, and Markdale \$50,000.

MUCH POLITICS IN SIGHT

Dominion Parliament opens this week with no doubt some important business before them. One of the burning questions will be cheaper transportation in which both the Western Provinces and Maritime Provinces are interested, while Quebec and Ontario cannot be called indifferent. The prospect of lowered transportation costs does not seem to be a bright one, while truckage by motor keeps increasing year by year. There will no doubt be a spectacular introduction of the new member for North Hastings, in whose person rests the greatest Liberal victory of the year. Premier King in one of his speeches, intimated that with too much factional opposition there would be an appeal to the country so the Session is likely to be of great interest.

Premier Ferguson's family of Ontario politicians meets next week with problems all their own. Not the least of these will be the display of strength of about twenty of his "wet" followers, who, it is presumed are going to press upon their leader some form of local option in liquor selling in either that voted "wet." It is confidently expected that the Premier and Attorney-General will stand firm to promises and refuse to interfere with the result of the Plebiscite, and the promises made thereon.

The question of Presbyterian Union is also to be dealt with, as it was withdrawn last session. Last year's opponents of the measure may bolster up their attitude by consideration of the large anti vote in Toronto, but surely good judgment will prevail and the example of the Dominion and other provinces be followed.

Anyway the next two months are likely to give us a surfeit of politics.

town would certainly extend a welcome and would, we feel confident, take a live interest in their week's visit.

Apart from the idea that it would be nice to have them, it would surely be in order as well, since Owen Sound is no more the County Town than it is the County seat. It would of course require the bringing of County Treasurer Parker and County Clerk Rutherford and who are residents of Owen Sound, down to the southern town, but who would, find disfavor with that, for Durham in June is an Arcadia.

We would like to see an arrangement of some kind made, whereby our County Council men may visit about the towns of Grey and thus acquire first hand knowledge of the most advantages they possess.

Prov. Dept. of Health May Enforce Waterworks

At Monday's Council meeting the following letter, and report re the sanitary condition of Durham's wells was read. It was received recently by the Town Clerk, W. B. Vollett:

The report of the water supply available and the one of the wells, in which four out of every five in town, were condemned for being impure, was published in the Review of Dec 28, 1923, when the report was first made public. It showed the degree of pollution of each individual well in Durham and only about 20 were found passably free from contamination, in 125 tested.

These disclosures were made in the Review just previous to the vote on installing waterworks here, but it apparently did not influence the ratepayers, as the installation of a waterworks system was defeated over two to one.

The receipt of the above letter may be taken to indicate that the Prov. Department of Public Health are reminding the Council to take some action in the matter, and if the town does not soon voluntarily assume a waterworks system to safeguard its health, the Dept. may at a not distant date, compel the town to do so.
