"Castellar," Khandallah, Wellington, N. Z., Dec. 30, 1924

Dear Friends: After five months in the Dominion of New Zealand, I feel at liberty to express myself regarding the customs, conditions, etc., of the country. The journey from Auckland, where

we landed, to the Capital city, Wellington, at the very south of the North Island, was very interesting. The train left Auckland about seven o'clock in the evening. During the night we climbed to the summit of a range of mountains where there was a skiff of snow, and the trains were very cold. Every short distance i seemed to me, the train stopped for ten minutes, to allow passengers who wished tea, to rush out to the refreshment rooms, drink a cup of tea and rush back again.
