Saddening news of the sudden death of the above, a nephew of Mrs. C. Ramage, Durham, was received by her on Tuesday. The following is taken from the "Drumheller Mail," Alberta, and contains the chief facts. Previous to going West some years ago, he was teller in Flesherston Br. of Standard Bank:

The death of Cecil C. Legate, one of Drumheller's well known young business men, occurred suddenly at his home, Feb. 17th. On Monday he was about town as usual and in the evening he worked at his books till about 10.30. Early Tuesday morning he took convulsions and before the doctor arrived, had passed away.

PRICEVILLE

The death of Mr John G. Beaton took place Monday at the home of his son William on the 4th con of Artemesia, after an illness of some months from the effects of a paralytic stroke. Mr Beaton and family lived in the village for a few years, and during that time his beloved wife was called to the Great Beyond.

Since then he has made his home among his family and during his extended illness has been tenderly cared for by his daughters and daughter-in-law. The funeral takes place Wednesday to Priceville cemetery. We refrain from writing more, knowing that a fuller account will be given by someone who knew him better than your correspondent, from Glenelg, where he spent so many years. We extend our sympathy to sorrowing relatives and friends.

JOHN WHITE John White, one of the earliest pioneers of Grey Co., passed away in Toronto recently at his cousin's, Mrs Jas. Cornfield. Mr White's father settled in Artemesia 71 years ago. At that time the Durham Road had not been built and C.P.R. line to O. Sound was not in existence. For many years he lived in Glenelg Tp., but since the death of his wife 13 yrs. ago, has made his home with relatives in Toronto. One brother David of Toronto survives him, also two sons, John J. of Markdale and David of Toronto, and two daughters, Mrs. Thos Taylor of Artemesia and Miss Madge of New York.

PRICEVILLE & GLENELG We have passed the severest weather in years during the two days of last week and this Monday morning, 2nd March is cold enough to go to the wood shed for a split of stove wood. Time is marching along and we are now into that month which to many of us is always a sad reminder of the passing events of many years ago.

On the 16th March our life partner was called away and on the 17th, our brother, D. McDonald's wife was called away; also the former at the age of 33 years—the latter at the age of 26 years—two women whose personality and manners corresponded. On the 21st of March a few years ago our niece, Nurse Charlotte McDonald was called away suddenly at Brandon, Man. To many in the town and the vicinity of Durham, where Miss McDonald faithfully discharged her duties, she will be remembered. She was often sent as a nurse by the Great Physician to attend to her patients, and it could be said of her that she was sent as a means of saving others from death, but herself she could not save.

The late Rev. Mr Whaley who often visited the sick where Miss McDonald attended, while preaching the funeral sermon said that when she came to the bedside of the patients with a pleasant smile, it cheered them that their attending nurse was in good cheer. To the aged mother and sisters, this 21st March will be a sad reminder to them, besides other sad reminders some time ago, of the death of husband and father.

To them and to many of us, the mounds on the brae in McNeal's cemetery will be a reminder of the losses sustained by all.

And we were almost forgetting that on the 22nd March, something less than a century ago, we arrived in the old Township of Vaughan on a blustery night, but on a day or two previous, our mother made a loaf of sugar to be ready at our arrival as granulated sugar was dear and hard to find. We sent up a yell as if complaining of the uncomfortable reception given us by our attendants. But years have passed by since that far away date and many obstacles met on the way, but here we are, allowed unto this day to be penning articles for the 'Review.'

A mother who raised six stalwart sons and two daughters was telling us that when she had her first born 73 years ago, that her bed covering was covered with snow and yet she and her baby were saved from having caught cold. This shows some of the hardships of mothers of long ago.

Miss Margaret McLean who spent a few weeks in Hamilton with friends returned again on the storriest night of last week and as the train was late, no conveyance could be found. But she bravely weathered the storm to her home, one mile distant on Lambton St. Some of the younger of her sex would look for a stopping place nearby or go to the Hahn House for over night.

XIV "BUILDERS OF THE CANADIAN COMMONWEALTH." By George H. Locke

This is a collection of short biographies of men who have helped to make our country what it is today. To read these pages is to gain some idea of the mental powers, earnest sincerity, and the eloquence of those Canadian leaders whose voices we shall hear no more. We get a glimpse of the many problems that have been solved in the past century and the varied ways in which this was done. In reading the speeches we should keep before us, if we can, the personality behind each of them because the career, the manner and the point of view are inseparable from the particular utterance.

The history of our country as revealed in the speeches of her public men when they are discussing the problems of national life with which they are confronted, makes interesting reading. It is worth while to take time to read about the men who took part in the struggle for responsible government, for representation by population, and for the confederation of the Provinces.
