Death of Gilb. McEachern, Ex-Reeve of Egremont

Friday of last week one of the prominent men of Egremont township passed away at the age of 67 years. Gilb. McEachern, owing largely to his municipal activity in recent years was widely known and respected and his passing calls from a large number of expressions of regret at the closing of a pure and useful life.

In early days he taught school for eight years in the township, and for 25 years in a school at Aberfoyle near Guelph. For one term he was assistant in Durham Model School. Retiring from teaching owing to failing health, he sought activity in the municipal sphere and was fairly successful, being five years in the Council, three of them as reeve. He retired from office only last New Year's.

In this capacity he made many friends in County Council, and he did important work. He was also a J. P. and won commendations for ability and fairness in this position.

He married Miss Lizzie Salt of Hespeler in 1908, but she died after two years. Four brothers and two sisters survive: John of Wlarton; James of Vancouver, B. C.; Rev. P. M. of Point Edward; Mrs Geo. Yates of Moose Jaw, Sask.; Neil, and Mrs. Alex. Webster, Con. 6, Egremont.

Mr. McEachern was born in Inlay, Scotland, and came with his parents to this country at the age of 7 years. The funeral on Monday last was a sincere expression of grief and was largely attended, among visitors from a distance being his wife's father and mother from Hespeler and her brother and his wife from Guelph.

He was a member of St. Albans Lodge, A. F. & A. M., Mount Forest, and was also a member of the Orange Society, and of Westminster Presbyterian Church.

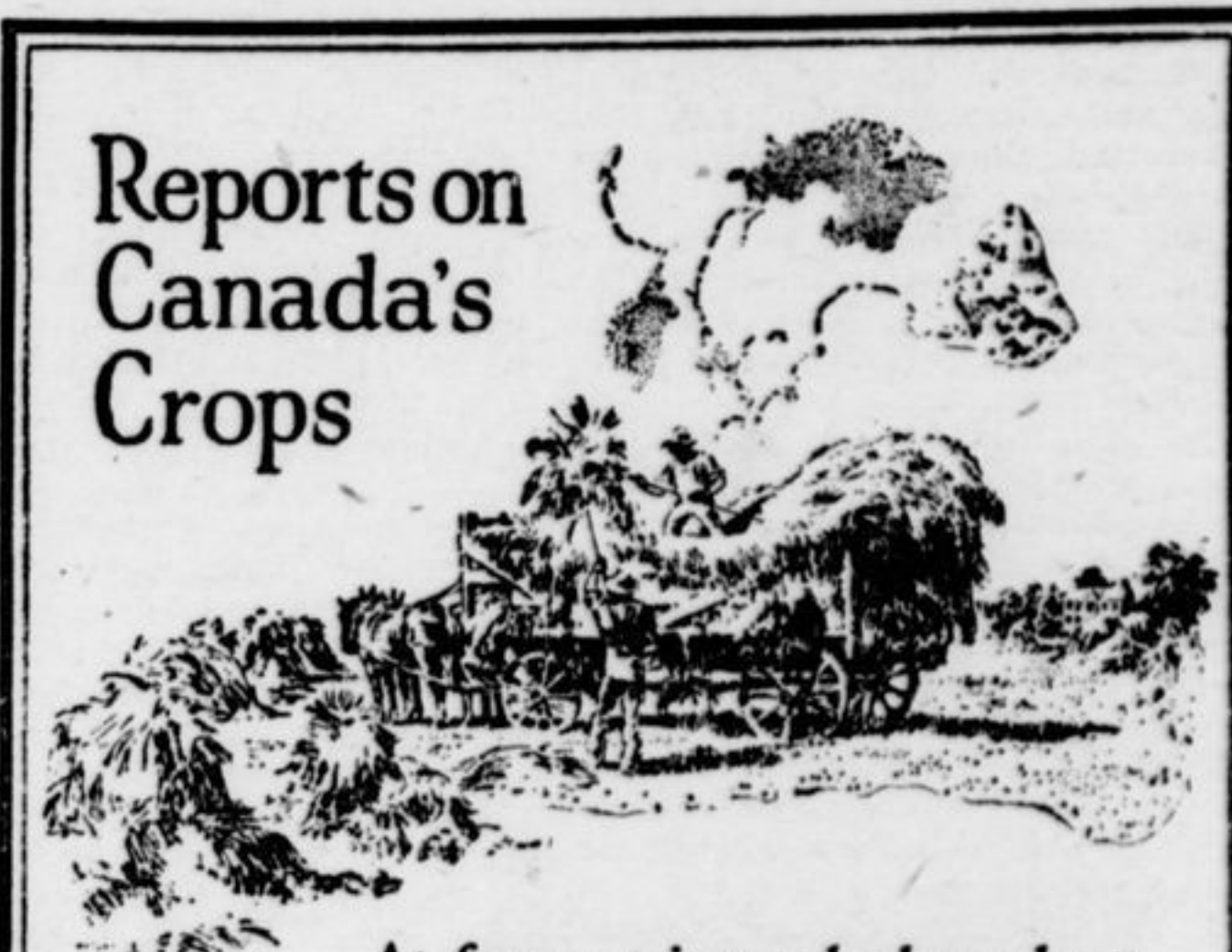

This will be a branch of the Ontario Motor League and should result in many benefits to the district as a whole and the municipalities and motorists in particular.

Received a Severe Cut While working at his shingle mill on the former Chris. Fifth farm on the Durham Road, Glenelg, Monday, Mr Zeous Clark tripped and fell against a saw, cutting his right wrist, almost to the bone. Mr C. grandson, Campbell Clark, was with him, and they used first aid methods in binding up the wound, until the reached Dixie, where a medical aid Mr Clark was quite weak for a short time, due to much loss of blood.

Twelve Years for Arson Found guilty of conspiracy to commit arson, Thomas Slav, formerly of Allan Park, was sentenced by Mr Justice Riddell at the Spring Assize at Whitby last Wednesday to serve 12 years in Kingston Penitentiary. The jury was out only 20 minutes before returning a verdict of guilty. The prisoner protested his innocence, claiming he never planned with anyone to burn Bartlett's general store at Zephyr last fall.

Continuing Presbyterian Church As announced last week, Rev. W. J. Burnett, of Dromore, conducted service in the Town Hall on Sunday evening last for the benefit of the non-concurring Presbyterians on the question of Church Union. A good congregation of nearly 200 assembled and one may hope the group will be as efficacious in the hall as in the church and as much enjoyed. Following the service, a Provisional Committee of ten was appointed to manage the affairs of the church until June 10th next, when definite organization is to be made.

A Sunday School is also to be inaugurated in Town Hall next Sunday at an hour in the afternoon to which provisional arrangements were effected on Tuesday evening.
