**Induction Service at Fairbairn Church**

At a special meeting of the Presbytery of Saugeen held in Fairbairn church on the afternoon of Friday, the 24th inst., Rev. Wallace Johnston, formerly of Churchville, was inducted into the pastoral charge of Fairbairn and Holstein congregations. The congregations named had been vacant for the past seven months.

The beautiful weather that prevailed that day added greatly to the joy that filled the hearts of all present when they realized their long-lingering desire to have a shepherd to care for their spiritual welfare, was now by the will of God accomplished.

After the Presbytery convened the Moderator, Rev. W. H. Smith of Durham, called upon Rev. Mr. Small of Harrison, to conduct the service of worship which preceded the induction ritual. The Rev. preacher chose for his text, Ephesians chap. 2, verse 10: "For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them." The discourse was a worthy exposition of the sacred truth of the text.

After the service of worship, the Moderator called upon Rev. W. J. Burnett of Dromore, who was moderator pro tem for the vacant congregations, to communicate the various acts done by which the call to Mr. Johnston had been consummated. The ritual of induction was then proceeded with.

Rev. W. Johnston was then called upon and answered the various questions submitted by the Moderator.

Rev. Mr. McCrae of Mt. Forest addressed the newly inducted pastor regarding the duties of a minister to his people in a clear and concise manner to the edification of all present.

Rev. W. J.
