The first of the Bank of Montreal's Crop Report has reached us. Last year they proved reliable and interesting. Here are brief extracts:

GENERAL: In the Prairie Provinces seeding has been started earlier than usual, and the seed bed generally is in excellent condition. The season is 3 weeks earlier than usual in Ontario and earlier than the average in Eastern Quebec and Maritime Provinces. In B. Columbia the season is about 2 weeks late.

#### FISHING PROHIBITED ALONG SAUZEEN, NEAR WALKERTON

The action of several farmers in the vicinity of Walkerton along the Sauguen River, in evicting trappers and fishermen from their premises has caused consternation in the ranks of the followers of Isaac Walton. Some of those who were ordered off the banks of the river have consulted legal advisors and have been told that the farmers were acting within their rights under a recent act and that furthermore on all the streams the farmers through whose property the stream flows, has all privileges to the centre of the stream. To the great majority this is practically not known and a serious bit of news for most fishermen who largely rely on the smaller streams for their sport. It really means that if the farmers so desire they can prohibit fishing in the rural parts of Ontario by white men almost entirely. Under an old act the Indian has the right to free use of the island for fishing and trapping purposes to a depth of five feet along the river.

Local fishermen are up in arms over the matter and will endeavor to find out where they stand before the bass season opens on June 15th. It is probable also that an effort will be made to have all so-called prescribed trout streams, the stock for which is secured from the Government, thrown open to the public, as in most cases these are controlled by a club of 6 or 10 individuals to the exclusion of all other citizens.—Tel. Que.

#### SOUTH BRUCE HAS MANY PROSPECTIVE TORY CANDIDATES

With a liberal nomination close at hand in South Bruce, speculation is also rife regarding the probable candidate for the Conservative nomination contest. The name of ex-Warden Robt. Johnston, present Reeve of Lucknow, has been mentioned for some time as a possible high tariff candidate for the riding of South Bruce. Mr F. W. Lippert, Walker-

ton, who carried the Tory banner in the last Provincial election, is favored in many quarters. Another name which will no doubt be prominently considered is W. M. Shaw, a Walkerton manufacturer and President of South Bruce Conservative Association. John Purvis, the popular auctioneer, who was the defeated candidate in the last Federal contest, will figure in the possibilities of the situation. Dr Fowler of Teawater and Dr Spence of Walkerton, are also spoken of in this connection.

ACROSS CANADA AND BACK

The wonder trip of the coming season will be conducted by Dean Laird of Macdonald College, to Victoria, B. C. and back.

Returning the trip will be via the Okanagan Valley, Nelson, the Kootenay Lakes, Windemere Bungalow Camp from which place the party will be motored to Banff, 104 miles over the newly-completed Banff-Windemere Highway, the most charming and awe inspiring trip it is possible to conceive, with stops at Radium Hot Springs, Vermilion River and Storm Mountain Bungalow Camps—another day at Banff, then Edmonton, Saskatchewan, Devil's Gap Bungalow Camp, near Kenora on the Lake of the Woods, thence from Fort William to Port McNicholl, thence rail to Toronto, where the trip will terminate August 10th.

Everything is included at the price of \$225 from Toronto: transportation, sleeping cars, accommodation in hotels and bungalow camps, meals in diners, hotels and on steamers, sight seeing tours at points visited, and all gratuities.
