**Send-off to Mr & Mrs W. Grant**  
Large Crowd and Fine Weather

As a community function the gathering on Friday night last to bid adieu to Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Grant, Normanby, before their removal to Mt. Forest, has rarely been exceeded. Neighbors from all round and some old friends from Durham swelled the crowd, till there was from 250 to 300 present. The evening was ideal and the spacious lawn could be used, and was used, for no house would hold them. An adjoining field held about 50,000 of lawn and a beautiful moon looked down on a happy crowd and everything passed off "lovely."

After an hour or two of social chatting Rev. W. J. Burnett called the gathering to order and after an appropriate opening, asked Mr. and Mrs. Grant to be seated in a representative capacity. Mrs. J. J. Wilton then read the address which was below and stalwart neighbors brought in the gifts which were two fine rocking chairs, an elegant couch and a bed of congoletum rug.

To Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Grant  
Dear Friends:  
You see around you friends and neighbors associated with you for a lifetime in Knox Church, Normanby and in this community, who have long looked upon you as the long association is to be severed by your removal to Mt. Forest in all the years you have been with us. We have always valued your good neighborly and your kindly interest in every community movement. We have strongly felt it was incumbent on us at this time to give expression to this sentiment.

While feeling the regret, we also rejoice that some of your family will still be with us in the old Grant home, and that you and other members of your family will not be too far away to prevent you from joining with us occasionally in the future.

We have been stirred with sorrow that your long healthy lives have lately been marred by the automobile accident to Mr. Grant and by Mrs. Grant's temporary illness. We pray and pray that in the new home you both may be blessed with a return to normal conditions, ensuring you a future of health and prosperity.

As a tangible expression of these sentiments we ask your acceptance of these gifts and again assure you of our good wishes towards you in your new home.

Mr. Grant in acknowledgment in behalf of himself and his wife, was particularly happy in his reply. Speaking from the place of his birth he had a long record of many kind associations with neighbors around him. He spoke of the change of hood days that he remembered seeing deer quite common. He expressed deepest gratitude for the kindness shown him during his enforced lay off in hospital and at home as a result of his accident and he was moved even more strongly by the kindly words of the address and by the splendid gifts. He assured them that in their new home, there would ever be a kindly welcome for old friends of Normanby and Egreemont.

Mr. Campbell Grant, now a Walkerton lawyer, called upon to supplement his father's reply and did so most creditably. He thanked all and sundry for kindly words and deeds extended to his parents in the trying days they had passed through since the accident. He was sure they would have a kindly welcome when they called upon them in Mt. Forest and he promised this himself if they came to Walkerton, a double welcome if they brought him business!

There was then called upon in turn, Mr. Zenus Clark of Durham, for many years a neighbor at Varney; Mr. John Aldred, now of Durham, formerly in the community; Mr. D. Leith, Durham, a neighbor for many years; Dr. Leeson, ex-M.P.P., Varney, and long a neighbor; Mr. T. McVice, a neighbor longer than any of those mentioned and Mr. C. Ramage, for ten and a half years teacher in the section. All had regrets at the breaking up of old associations, but breathing good wishes for the future in their new home. Regrets were also expressed for Mr. Grant's severe accident, and hoped he would soon be able to fling away his crutches and enjoy his new life. There were kind words also from Mrs. Grant and hopes that her temporary illness would soon pass away.

These kindly testimonies were interlarded with fine musical selections, beginning with community singing before the presentation. Other numbers and all appreciated were solos by the teacher, Miss Barr, by Miss F. Kerr, Miss W. Blyth and by Peter Ramage. The program was closed loyally by the National Anthem, but, bless you, there was more to follow for the ladies had made provision to give a lunch to the large crowd and this function was also carried to success, and was a credit to the organizers. But, bless you, again that crowd did not want to go home, the singers informally clustered around the piano and sang community snatches as a midnight serenade, hosts of personal goodbyes and good wishes were exchanged. Mr. and Mrs. Grant old timers discussed old times, youth and beauty would have liked a platform, the old moon kept shining, and we rather think that the wee sma' hour was past before the last of the party were gone.

Mr. Grant is using his crutches freely now and if he keeps on gaining will soon not need them. The Review sends best wishes to both Mr. and Mrs. Grant, and hope they will have much happiness in their new home.
