It will be noted that the number of charges is almost equally balanced between the Presbytery almost exactly double the number of members, as it now covers the whole county.

Jury Gave Verdict of Accidental Death

"That Archibald McDonald met his death accidentally by being struck by a freight train at Varney crossing on July 22nd, 1925" was the verdict of the coroner's jury at the hearing last Thursday afternoon. Dr. Easton of Aytun, was coroner, Crown Attorney Dyer of O. Sound was the prosecuting attorney and Barrister R. E. Laidlaw of Toronto, acted on behalf of the C.N.R. The jury comprised H. J. Snell, foreman, R. L. Saunders, J. H. Hunter, D. M. Saunders, Geo. Noble, Ab. Noble, V. Hahn, Geo. McMeekin.

Chas. Heywood, owner of the car struck, and who is still crippled as a result of the accident, testified that he did not see or hear the train or any signals. He had turned round in front of Blyth's store and had kept the car on low gear returning up the slight grade to the crossing. This extra noise doubtless prevented him from hearing the train.

Wm. Portice, blacksmith, at Varney gave evidence that curtains were on left side of car, it was going about 10 miles per hour, and he had heard engine whistle 200 or 300 feet down the track. J. W. Blyth testified he had seen car turning and train approaching in same glance: the train was then 300 feet or more from crossing, and he thought those in car would notice train. Wm Finnigan was driving south towards Varney and 300 feet north of crossing, he saw car turn towards him, and heard train whistle twice. He expected car would stop in front of crossing.

Geo. McGee, engineer of the freight, swore the train was not exceeding 25 miles per hour, and he did not see or hear car until the crash, as he sits on right side of cab. He has automatic bell ringing daily between Holstein and Varney: it was ringing that day and he also remembered whistling for both crossings.

Chas. Burns, fireman, saw the car approaching slowly and thought it would stop just before the track. Wm. Bailey, brakeman, for the engine, first saw car 100 feet from crossing and saw nothing to obstruct view. The train had made a good
