PREMIER KING MAKES A NOTABLE APPOINTMENT

Vincent Massey, head of the well-known manufacturing firm, has been taken into the King Government as Minister without Portfolio. The appointment has caused something of a sensation in political circles as a triumph for Premier King. Hon. Mr. Meighen is trying to make the tariff the big issue in the campaign and to have his opponent endorsed by a leading manufacturer is just a little cruel. Mr. Massey is a grandson of the founder of the firm and is a young man of ability and many attainments outside of politics and business.

He will undoubtedly be a strength to the Government, and being a good speaker will strengthen the campaign in the interest of the Liberal party. Other straws here and there are showing that the wind is likely to blow the King Gov't into power again, with an increased majority.

Hanover Cement Plant Closed

Hanover is to lose one of its important industries, Hanover Cement & Stone Co., Ltd., having sold out, it is understood to the Canada Cement Co. The plant was closed last week, and has thrown about 60 men out of employment.

The manufacture of cement was started in Hanover some 25 years ago. Messrs Daniel and J. E. Knechtel organizing the Hanover Portland Cement Co. and ran along till 1921, when they sold out to Toronto interests. The local Co. has been handicapped for some months owing to the fact that the raw material had to be shipped in. As there is considerable over-production in Canada, it is unlikely that the plant will be operated by the purchasers and will probably be dismantled. The local manager, Mr. E. D. Gruetner, will likely remain in Hanover.
