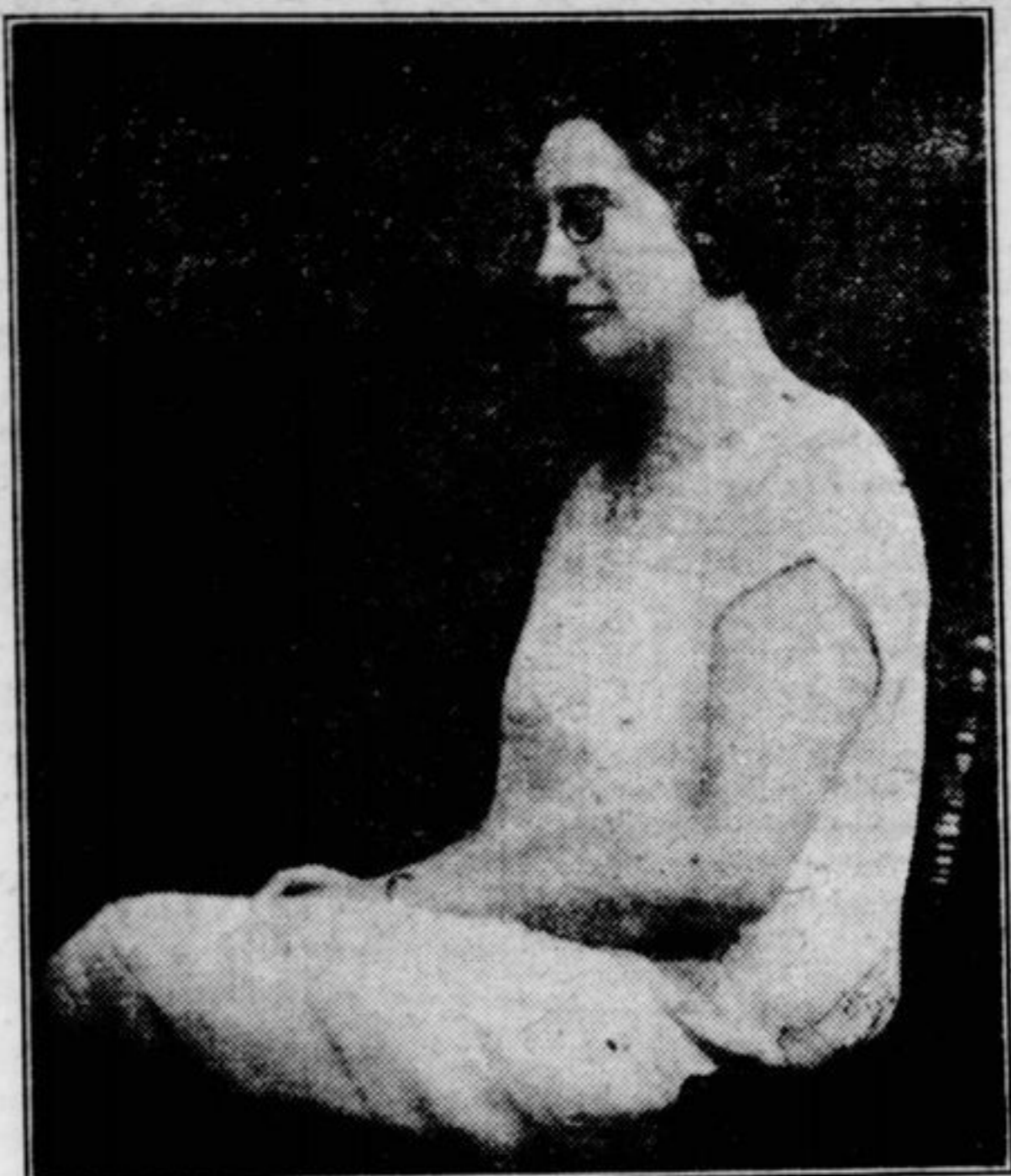

MISS AGNES C. MacPHAIL, M. P.
Elected a Second Time in South-East Grey

All Ontario Cabinet Ministers Good Organ Recital Fall in Conservative Landslide

Both Premier King and Hon. A. Meighen Probably Defeated. — Ontario and Maritimes Almost Solidly Conservative.

The great decision has been made and at latest reports the returns stand:
Liberals 97
Conservative 119
Progressive 18
Independent 4

The Conservatives, the smallest group in the last parliament, are now the largest. As we write it is still doubtful if Meighen can form a government with a clear majority. Ontario has elected only 9 Liberals and 2 Progressives, Quebec 60 Lib. and 4 Con., N. Brunswick 1 Lib. and 10 Con., Nova Scotia 3 Lib. and 11 Con.; Sask. 13 Liberals.

In North Grey, Duncan, con., is elected by 562 majority and Sinclair, con., by 761 in North Wellington. Both Bruces went Liberal. Toronto as usual is solidly Conservative and all other cities as well.

Presbyterians Extend Call to Rev. B. D. Armstrong

At a congregational meeting of the Presbyterian body worshipping in the Town Hall, on Monday night, choice was made of Rev. B. D. Armstrong, who preached to them two weeks ago. He is a missionary from South China, ill health compelling him to leave that field. We understand the sermons preached here were among the first he has preached since returning, and he left a splendid impression.

Mr. Armstrong has accepted the call and will in all likelihood preach his first sermon here as pastor on Nov. 22nd. The induction will be arranged at Presbytery meeting in Palmerston next week. Mr. James Ledingham's house on College St., until recently occupied by Principal Robb, has been secured for Rev. and Mrs. Armstrong.

Mr. Armstrong comes from the newest of the missions of the Canadian Presbyterian church which was established some 20 years past, at the urgent request of the Chinese in Canada, who come chiefly from that part. There are 2 schools of 80 pupils each, where students spend three or four years in healthful surroundings under direct Christian influence. One of the three modern Hospitals was built by the Chinese themselves at a cost of \$40,000 and is one of the best equipped hospitals in that part. Mrs. Armstrong is a graduate nurse and during the civil war of recent days helped to care for as many as 33 wounded soldiers in the hospital at one time.

Agnes C. Macphail again M. P. by Nearly 1300

With weeping change throughout the country, Miss Agnes C. MacPhail's victory in South East Grey was a notable one. Her majority will be nearly 1300 and had polling day been fine, it would probably have reached 2000. Miss MacPhail will still be Canada's only lady member.

Returns came in slowly, showing reduced majorities, but still substantial, and a small vote all through the Riding, owing to the stormy day and lessened interest. The Town Hall was filled by large crowd to whom the news of Miss MacPhail's election was very gratifying. The welcome news came that she was en route over and as she entered, a great demonstration of welcome was accorded her.

She expressed appreciation over the victory and thanked all for standing by her as they had done. The result showed that the electors of South Grey think their own thoughts and independent thinking is what is sadly needed in Canada to-day. The mob spirit still prevails and the country can still be stamped.

The result also shows that Canada is divided into sections and broken in pieces in interests and representation. The uncertainty of parliamentary office tends to make public servants untrue to their trust, and the tendency is to "feather the nest" while the feathering is good. All independent thinking people will rejoice in this great victory in South East Grey.

Celebrated Fifty Years of Wedded Life

Golden Wedding of Mr. and Mrs. John Vessie, Rocky Saugen

There was unusual activity around the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Vessie on Monday afternoon and evening, when friends and neighbors—over a hundred in number—joined with the members of the family in honoring this worthy couple, who that day reached their fiftieth milestone of wedded life. Both are yet in good health, Mr. Vessie being 81 years of age, and his life partner about 70.

Mr. Vessie was born in Nassagaweya, at Elen Mills, her maiden name being Mary Elizabeth Kerr. In 1875 she was married to Mr. Vessie by the Methodist minister in Durham and they took up home-making on his farm just above Thos. Turnbull's about two miles north of town. Living about twenty five years here, they removed to their present farm, north of Rocky school, about a mile beyond the former home, where they have spent another quarter century.

To them were born a large family of seven daughters and three sons, one of whom Andrew died, 19 years ago. Eight of the nine children were present Monday at the old home to show their filial regard and bestow on the elderly couple, handsome mementoes as a memento of the day. The sons and daughters are: John of St. Marys; Mrs. Buchan (Margaret) of Clifton Springs, N. Y.; Mrs. John McKechnie (Jean), Glenelg; Mrs. Walter Clark (Minnie) and Mrs. Doug. Clark (Arnes) near home; Mrs. Louis Schilthro (Mabel), near Chesley; Earl and Reba at home. Mrs. David Watson, of Treherne, Man., was the only daughter absent. There are twenty grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

There were about fifty in all present in the afternoon, which was marked by the presentation of two fine, easy cushioned chairs and a couch to the parents by the assembled family. At 4.30 all sat down to a sumptuous dinner and in the evening over 125 gathered from the neighborhood and beyond filling the home to overflowing. The night was spent in tendering good wishes to the principals of the event and in games and dancing. Many handsome gifts were received, among them being three \$5 gold pieces.
