Prices Soaring in Sunny Florida

The Review received an interesting letter from Mrs. Thos. E. Brown, who with Mr. Brown, are spending their second winter in Florida. While the letter was not intended for publication, we are taking the liberty of cutting some interesting sections therefrom. Mr. Brown has purchased a lot at Lauderdale but will not build for a time.—Ed.

Fort Lauderdale, Florida. "This place has grown so fast since we left last spring, we would scarcely know it again. It used to be called Oakland Park, but there have been some new developers come in and they changed the name to 'Floranada.' I don't think they improved the name very much. They are called the British American developers and say they are going to make it the prettiest spot in the world. I will give you a little idea of some of the prices prevailing. The Presbyterian Manse was recently sold for \$45,000 and they were offered \$175,000 for the church for a business site, but turned it down. Living is much higher this year than last: Potatoes \$1.25 a peck; packed eggs 65c a doz.; butter 65c a lb. Fruit is not nearly so plentiful and much higher in price. Board is \$10 to \$14 a week in private homes and a four roomed house will bring \$75 a month rent. There were three men landed here Sunday last from Toronto, started work Tuesday at plastering, each getting \$18 per day. They were certainly lucky. The traffic here is something terrible. In Lauderdale they have started one way traffic. Miami has nothing on Fort Lauderdale now. At the Post Office they will be lined up away out on the street, each waiting their turn. I went up to Pompano to post some mail and the lady told me I could leave it but perhaps it would not go out for one week, they were working overtime, so took it back to Lauderdale. All being well, we are planning to spend Xmas on the beach."
