Durham's District by Win in Chesley

A brilliant wind-up to the district N. H. L. season was the 4-1 victory of Durham Seniors on Chesley ice, mentioned in last week's issue. The two games with Durham were Chesley's only defeats this season. Durham's N. H. L. record is 6 wins, 0 losses and they now will play in first round Senior Semi-finals, probably with Palmerston or Elmira. Chesley as second placers, will play off in the intermediate semi-finals.

A Chesley dispatch in O. Sound Sun-Times reports Durham's victory: "In a Northern League Senior game here last night, Durham defeated Chesley by 4-1 in a well-played and hard fought game. The homesters were outplayed on the night's play and they have no excuses to offer for their licking. Durham played fast, dazzling hockey that night and looked about good enough to take most teams into camp. They showed neat team work and back checked a lot better than Chesley. The locals were far from outclassed as they played consistent hockey and were in the fight to the finish.

Durham led at the end of every period. Buschen, their star wing player, was the outstanding man of the ice. He turned in a sensational performance on the forward line and was always a thorn in the side of Chesley puck carriers as well as being very effective when in possession of the rubber. Knox Church ho'd large Congregational Social

A bumper crowd that taxed the capacity of Knox Church schoolroom, gathered there Monday evening and at the conclusion of the affair no one, we think, left but what were well pleased with what was said and done, as well as that consumed. Due to the heavy condition of the roads the Friday previous, this affair was shoved forward three days but there was no fall-out over doing so, as often proves the case in postponed events.

Shortly after 8 p. m., Reeve Wm. Weir of Glenelg took the platform and asked the audience to join in some community singing. Mrs. D. C. Town at the piano. An old-fashioned spelling contest was next in order. East side of Garafraxa vs. Western side. Master Elgin Blyth rendered a song and his sister Velma a reading, while Mrs. Wm. Derby read an interesting extract from Jessie Alexander's works. These were the individual numbers.

A comic duet had Miss Winnie Blyth and Mr. Walter Kerr on the platform and an action song of four S. S. No. 9 ladies brought laughter. "When Polly put the Pepper in the Tea." The ladies were Mrs. Jno McGirr Mrs. Geo. Stewart, Mrs. W. Weir, Jr., Miss Jessie Bell. "The Fortune Hunter" was also well received and given by four choir members of the church—Misses M. Hunter and Jessie Bell, Messrs Geo. Bell and Chas. Lang. Two pantomimes were pretty numbers, "Comin' thru the Rye" by Dorothy Robinson and "Home Sweet Home" by Susie Greenwood. A dialogue by Edge Hill young people also brought hearty applause. "The new hired man," and was given by Clarence Robinson and Henry Moffat. Each and every number was enjoyed.

Following the program a small army of waiters took charge of the catables and soon the tinkle of the tea cup was heard as well as the music of the tongue. The evening was brought to a close with Auld Lang Syne.

Ham. Allan is Durham's New Constable, etc.

There were a large number of citizens present at Monday's town council session, the majority attracted to hear the decision of the Council as to the appointment of the town utility man.

More Schoolyard Required
On behalf of the Public School Bd. E. A. Hay and J. P. Hunter were present. The former pointed out that Inspector Wright had reported insufficient play grounds at the Public school. The only available extra grounds nearby was W. A. McGowan's vacant lot, west of the school, across Elgin St. This lot Mr. McGowan would donate free if the Council would close Elgin St a short distance (north of Mill St to C. P. R. track). There was very little traffic on this street and the closed portion would further enlarge the playground, and ensure the safety of the children. Action was deferred until next meeting.

Likely Equip Motor Camp
The Ontario Motor League forwarded an enquiry about a motor camp, its equipment and facilities. On motion of Hunter—McClocklin, the Clerk was instructed to advise the League of Durham's camp—the grounds in rear of Town Hall, which it was hoped to equip this year.

A communication from the Good Roads Ass'n which meets in Toronto Feb. 24 to 26, asked that delegates be appointed and solicited membership fees of \$15. No action was taken. 8 per cent after Feb. 20th.

The Treasurer was instructed to notify all in arrears for taxes that 5 per cent penalty only will be imposed until Feb. 20th. After that date the Collector will start and 5 per cent will be added.

On motion of Hunter—Bell, the Clerk was instructed to write the Railway Board, opposing the proposed increase in rates by the Bell Telephone Co. for urban phones.

W. J. Vollett complained of the parking of rigs and sleighs in front of his home and driveway on Garafraxa St. The Mayor referred him to a town by-law which would grant relief.

Accounts totalling \$377.23 were passed.
F. McElraith reappointed Assessor.
For Assessor, there were two applicants, Robt. J. Lindsay and F. F. McElraith, former assessor. The latter was reappointed at same salary, \$125. Dr. A. M. Bell was appointed M. O. H. at salary of \$100.

Many applicants for Constable
For constable, caretaker of town and fire hall, general utility man there were five applications—Thos. Atchison at \$50 per month; Wm. Hill at \$50; Jos. Fleming at \$50 per month; A. Baird at \$65 per month; and Ham. Allan at \$60 per month.
McClocklin—McQueen: That application of Hamilton Allan be accepted. Carried. There was no discussion and the new constable commenced duties Wednesday. He will also be collector of taxes, sanitary inspector, caretaker of Town Hall and fire halls, and work on streets when necessary.

License wanted for Weigh Scales
Pres. John McGirr and Sec'y H. Edge were a delegation from the Live Stock Shipping Ass'n, to secure a license to charge for weighing live stock only at their scales at C. P. R. yards. At present they cannot charge and can hardly refuse to weigh, and they wish to charge any outside the Ass'n, the same fee as now charged by the town. They had shipped 63 cars of stock last year. The Council were not prepared to fix a license fee, or decide to give a license, and on motion of McClocklin—McQueen, the matter was laid over till next meeting.

Reeve gives Co. Council Experiences
Reeve Bell reported on County Council, and termed his experience there very helpful. He was a member of Finance, Education, Road and Bridge Committees. He referred to a special act passed two years ago giving High Schools a large County grant. It will mean about \$750,000 to Durham H. S. Board. Duddall and Flesherston had received it last year, but Durham had not. He made application for last year's and was informed the Board must do so. It will in all probability be paid at June session.

Then for upkeep of Co. links, towns and villages have been receiving 50 per cent of amount paid in. He sponsored a motion, which carried, that they receive 75 per cent back. Any town undertaking pavement gets back its full 100 per cent. This Hanover and Meaford are doing.

The Ladies Guild of Trinity Ch. had their Treasury enriched by \$25, as a result of their baking sale held on Saturday last.

Cont. Presbyterians Buy Hahn Stables for Church

The first annual meeting of this body was held on Monday night last in their temporary church quarters—the Town Hall. There was a good attendance and a lively and awakened interest taken in the business of the meeting. This interest grew into gratification as it was found that reports from Sunday School, Women's Mis. Society, Ladies' Aid, Managers, etc. showed that all were in a satisfactory condition, and the workers inspired to achieve still further progress.

There is a membership of over 150. Sunday School with six teachers has an enrolment of 50 and an average attendance of 30. Contributions in this first broken year amounted to \$545.58. For the same period the Women's Mis. Society raised \$233.01 and the Ladies' Aid showed receipts of \$485.47, of which, after donating \$100 towards the piano and other miscellaneous items, there remains in the bank \$312.20. For Missions the amount of \$87.80 had been realized, all of which had been forwarded to the church offices in Toronto.

The Treasurer's Statement shows cash from envelopes \$1257.90 and loose collections \$234.22, making from other sources the fine total of \$2010.25. All liabilities have been met and cash in bank still of \$590. The Managers in their Report, express appreciation to Mr. Robt. Morfat for donation of collection plates, hymn boards and pulpit, also Rev. Mr. Burnett for help and encouragement during the trying months. This report breathes optimism all through and closes with the hope that in the near future they would have a church home of their own.

At this meeting it was settled that they would close the deal for the Hahn property, so before long we may see the renovations begun that will give Durham its sixth Christian church.

The Burgess Contribution
A noted feature of the meeting was the announcement of a gift of \$1000.00 towards the needs of the church from Mr. and Mrs. John Burgess. This splendid liberality was received with much gratification by all present and furnishes a shining example for all to aim at so as to meet the heavy costs that the future will be sure to bring.

Education Committee: Messrs H. R. Koch, C. Ramage, Dr. Wolfe. Property Committee: Messrs C. L. Grant, H. McCrae, John Smith. C. L. Grant has been appointed by County Council for 3 years; H. R. Koch by Town Council for 3 years; H. McCrae by Public School Board for one year.

Principal Robb reported an enrolment of about 105. Average attendance, about 100. Lower than usual on account of storms and temporary illness.
Reeve Bell has reported that a delayed grant of \$750.00 is likely to be forthcoming at the June session, and probably a grant of about equal amount for 1926, which was gratifying news.
