The other case arose over the well known Voker Bodies defalcation. At least eight wage earners put in claims through Solicitor Campbell Grant of Walkerton, amounting to over \$300.

Mr. C. C. Middlebro conducted the town's case, Mr. Campbell Grant for the wage earners. Messrs W. Calder and W. A. McGowan gave evidence as to their interest in the property, and after several exhibits had been placed in Judge's hands, he reserved his decision for further examination.
