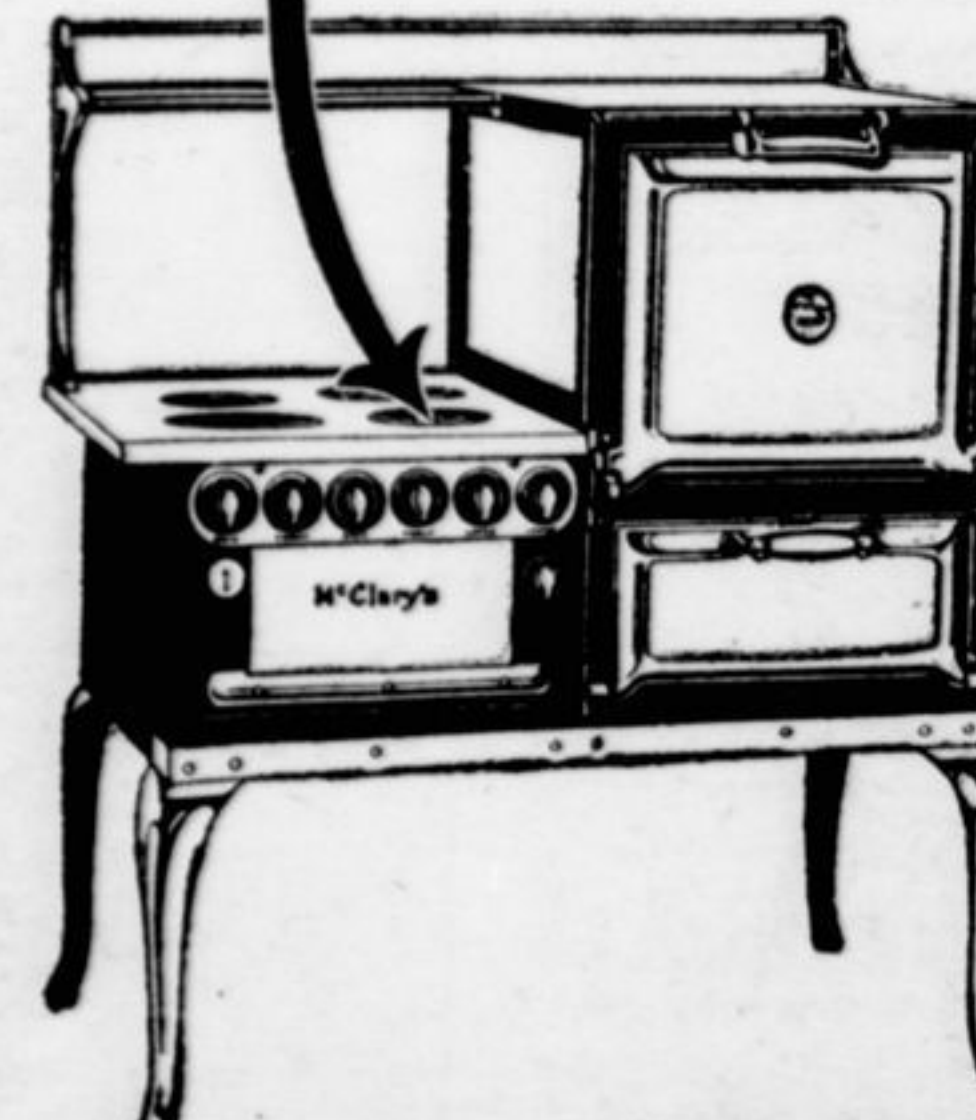

He was a faithful employee of the Furniture Co. until illness overtook him. One brother, Hugh, of New York city, survived him. Interment takes place to-day at Durham cemetery.
