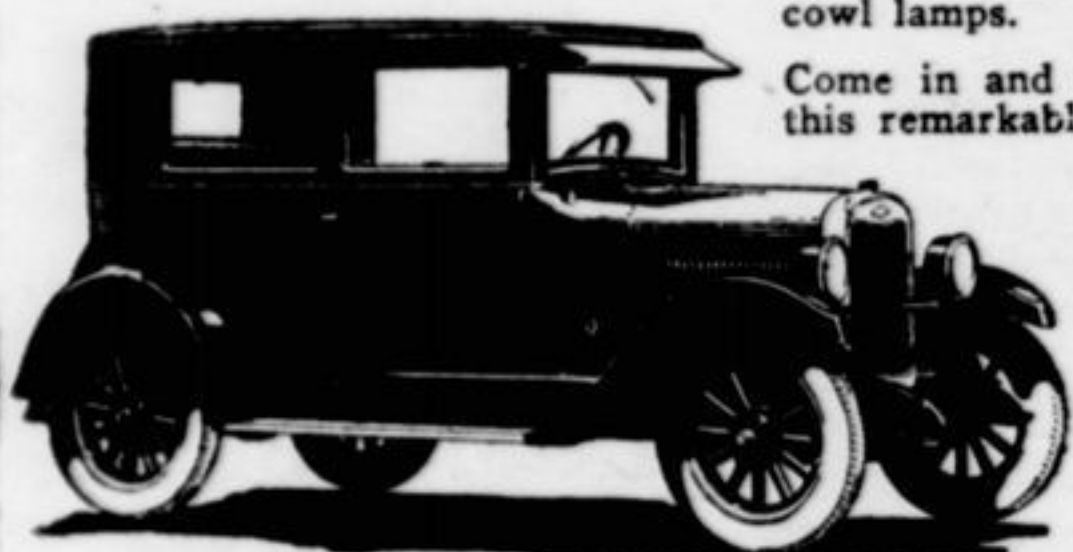

We hope our Canadian law will be more effective than in the States in suppressing the hooded gang, whose destructive tendencies are more in evidence than their uplift claims.

WILL THERE BE AN ELECTION?

Today, Wednesday, a crucial vote is expected at Ottawa, which may end the King Gov't. The vote is being taken on the report of the Customs probing commission, for and against, with special reference to Customs Officer Dolvin, M.P., who is charged with great irregularities. If it be true as alleged, that enough Progressives will vote for the Stevens (Conservative) amendment, to outvote the Liberal motion, the government may fall and in that case a new election may result. The report shows an unsavory state of affairs and those that connived at the wrong, doing by which Canada lost millions of dollars, should not be in public life.

Recently in a near by church the attendance has been small at the evening services. On Sunday the minister took occasion to remark, "Last Sunday I preached on 'Heaven,' but seemingly very few are interested!"

Enforcement to be more strict. At a meeting of the County Constables of Grey County, called by Sheriff J.S. Wilson, there were some 25 officers of the law present. The Sheriff in addressing the constables outlined the work of the constable as supposed to do while License Inspector M.C. Beckett spoke on the enforcement of the O.T.A. Provincial Constable Denton also addressed the gathering. Fish and game laws were thoroughly gone over, and the constables were instructed to pay more attention to their enforcement.

Reeve Bell Brings Gravel Pit Before County Council

Claims County did not carry out Agreement with Managers of Church

Reeve Allan Bell brought up the only debatable question at the Grey Co. Council last Wednesday afternoon. He asked information regarding a certain agreement which was made in 1921 by the Chairman of the County Roads Committee of the Co. Council and the trustees of the Presbyterian church, Durham. At that time, Mr. Wm Calder was the chairman of the committee and he purchased from the Presbyterian Ch. a gravel pit at the rear of the church for \$125. In the agreement signed by both parties, the county was not to dig closer than 15 feet from the sheds at the rear of the church or deeper than the depth of the road beside the pit. From what could be learned from Reeve Bell, the pit had been dug as close in some places as 5 feet from the sheds and had also been excavated deeper than agreement stated. The Trustees of the church are wondering whether or not the county are liable for any damages that may occur. There is a danger now of the sheds falling down, as the gravel pit is so close and if they do, the church wants to know to whom to go for damages. There was considerable discussion by members of the council on the question and Reeve Holm the present chairman of the County Roads Com. said he was a member of that committee in 1921 and had had nothing of the transaction with the Durham Presbyterian Ch. He said Mr Calder must have signed his name to the agreement without consulting his committee. The result of this information caused more discussion but Reeve Bothwell of Sydenham, moved that the matter should be left in the hands of Reeve Holm, that he investigate and if necessary have a lawyer say whether or not the transaction was a legal one or not. This motion was passed. Barrister Middlebro of Owen Sound, later gave the opinion that the County had no interest in the purchase of the pit, and a copy of his letter is to be forwarded the Trustees of Knox Church.

A speckled trout weighing four pounds and two ounces caught in the lake at Eugenia! To catch such a fish has been the dream of hundreds of the followers of Isaac Wallon, who have spent their leisure hours dangleing a worm in the quiet waters of that famous reserve which is in our midst. The dream has at last been broken, and has become a beautiful reality since Jim Dargavel, manager of the Durham Furniture Co at Rock Mills, brought a finny monster to justice on Friday evening last, off the eighth line bridge.

It was a lovely fish and one that would make some of these Nipigon fighters sit up and take notice. As warmer weather comes and the water recedes, the big fish are taking hold, and enthusiasm will soon be at its height. This part of Ontario is one of the best speckled trout fishing grounds in Ontario, large numbers of excellent size being reported. In one lake about 12 miles from Flesherton, 13 fish were caught that tipped the scales at 20 pounds, while another catch of thirteen weighed 13 pounds even. 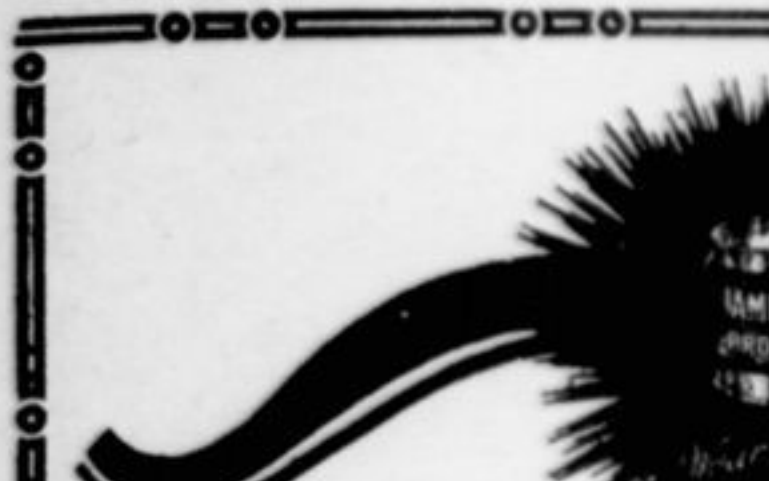
