The leader now is supplied with artificial assistance to carry his voice to keep have passed away and the aid timers have passed away and the old timers left to tell the tale of the olden days of the fathers and mothers who faithfully worshipped in the old edifice which was pulled down scores of years ago. The majority of those that worshipped there are quietly resting in the old acre and nothing but ashes are in their mounds while their assurance was of a blessed home in the Kingdom of the Almighty above.
