I.O.O.F. Hold Impressive Decoration Service

Rev. Mr. Whealan Addresses the Gathering Present and E. D. McClocklin gives Oddfellow Address

Some 50 or 60 of the brethren of Grey Lodge I. O. O. F., together with two cars of brethren from Mt Forest and one from Palmerston, took part in the annual Decoration Day service at Durham Cemetery on Sunday afternoon.

Assembling in the lodge room, the brethren marched to Smith's garage, where cars were parked, and drove to the cemetery where a large concourse of friends and visitors were gathered to participate in the service in remembrance of the departed brethren. Bro. Wm. McGillivray, Noble Grand, was in charge.

After the singing of the appropriate hymn "Take comfort Christians" and prayer by Bro. Allan Bell, Rev. J. H. Whealan read the scripture and delivered an address full of thought and most timely. "Our Decoration Days are too few," he stated. God's world is a colorful one, while we are inclined too much to gloom, especially at times of mourning. Watts, the English painter, depicts his death scenes in gray, i. e., black shot with white. To the Christian, the black of despair, is shot through with the white of God's promises. As Christians we meet today to keep a custom old as antiquity: to pay respect to the living as well as to the dead: for they whom we call dead are living in our memories and with God.

This is a reminder also to us of the duty laid on us, to care for their loved ones, to carry on their work, and to lay a wreath of deeds well done on their last resting place.

The past Grands and several brethren of the Lodge who carried beautiful baskets of flowers, then marched to each grave of the deceased brethren and a basket was hung over each. Those resting in Durham cemetery are the late Bros. Jno. Moodie, Jno. McLean, Ben Warner, Dan Campbell, Geo. Wilson, Wm. Fairman, Arthur K. Smith, Jno. H. Rose, Dr. J. C. Hutton, Adam Robertson, Wm. Irwin, Ronald Giles, Wm. Firth. The graves of Bros. J. Moodie and Jas. McFarlane in Trinity Church cemetery, were also decorated, and another deceased brother, J. Levine, is buried in Chicago.

During the decoration, "Shall we gather at the river" was sung and "Abide with me" later. The Oddfellow's address was given as in past years by Bro. E. D. McClocklin, in a most impressive manner. The singing of the doxology and benediction by Bro. Allan Bell closed the service.

Cheating at Examinations

MEETING UPHELD DISMISSAL OF PRINCIPAL MORTON

Principal Andrew Morton of Lambton Mills, formerly Principal of Durham Public School, was the storm centre of one of the most boisterous and unruly meetings ever held in York Township last Thursday, when about 200 ratepayers of the district were present. The trustees had asked for Principal Morton's resignation and the ratepayers by a vote of 58 to 43, passed a vote of confidence in their action, but not without determined opposition. The main objections to Mr. Morton evidently were alleged lack of discipline and we "are not satisfied with 50 or 60 per cent of students passing." He has been principal there for six years, ever since leaving Durham.

Mr. Morton said "I will be leaving this school, happy to know that I have the love of the children with me. What's at the bottom of the affair and I hope everybody hears it. I am not the only principal who has been fired by a school board that doesn't understand school matters. A township or metropolitan school board is needed badly in this county: a board made up of men experienced in school matters."

Mr. Morton while in Durham, married Miss Clara Greenwood, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Dan Greenwood, formerly of Edge Hill.

Bell Co. Sanctions Proposition for New Lines

Our readers will remember that last February a largely attended meeting was held in Durham of farmers from districts at present without telephone service, to discuss with Bell Telephone officials, the building of several new rural lines radiating from Durham Central. The farmers interested did not favor privately owned lines, and the plan suggested by District Manager J. T. Patton and special agent A. A. Smith of the Bell Co. that the subscribers supply the poles, dig post holes and erect them, whereupon the Co. would take them over and finish the construction work, paying \$2 per pole, was accepted by the meeting. This proposal has been laid before the head officials of the Co. and in conversation with Dist. Mgr. Patton last week end, he informed the Review that the Company had accepted the plan and were ready to proceed, and supervise the erection of poles and complete the lines.

Eight new lines with about 100 subscribers are contemplated. These will run up the Garafax Road from Jas. Lawrence's to Dornoch, up the 2nd con., Bentinck, for 8 or 9 miles, along the 4th and 6th cons., Glenelg, along the 22nd con., Egremont east to Proton townline and along the Garafax from Varney to Orchard. Another meeting will be called and advertised in the near future, when Committees from each district will report definitely as to subscribers obtainable and construction arrangements.
