1. Reduced the tariff on most of the implements of production and on many of the necessities of life.
  2. Reduced the tariff on motor cars.
  3. Cut down the income tax.
  4. Cut down the sales tax until now it is abolished on 236 groups of articles.
  5. Brought back penny postage.
  6. Abolished the receipt tax.
  7. Reduced the Gov't expenditure.
  8. Reduced the public debt.
  9. Balanced the budget.
  10. Arranged trade treaties.
  11. Passed legislation to check rum-running and trade in narcotics.
  12. Passed bills to check race-track gambling, these killed by Senate.
