New Treatment for Smutty Wheat
 Ontario farmers have for years been taking heavy losses on account of growing smutty wheat. These losses in the aggregate each season will run well over one million dollars, and we have known individual farmers who have taken discounts of from 5 cents to 15 cents per bushel on from 500 to 3000 bushels. If this loss were not easily preventable it would not be so bad, but the treatment given below is the latest information on this subject from the Ontario Agricultural College, and we pass it on to you in the hope that you will make use of it and save yourself the heavy discounts on smutty wheat.

Directions for Copper Carbonate Dust Treatment
 The dust should be applied at the rate of two or three ounces per bushel of wheat. Place the grain to be treated in a barrel or churn, about a bushel at a time. Add the required amount of Copper Carbonate Dust and then revolve the barrel or churn until the dust is thoroughly mixed with the grain. After this treatment the grain may be bagged and sown at once. Machines are now on the market for applying dust rapidly to large quantities of seed.
