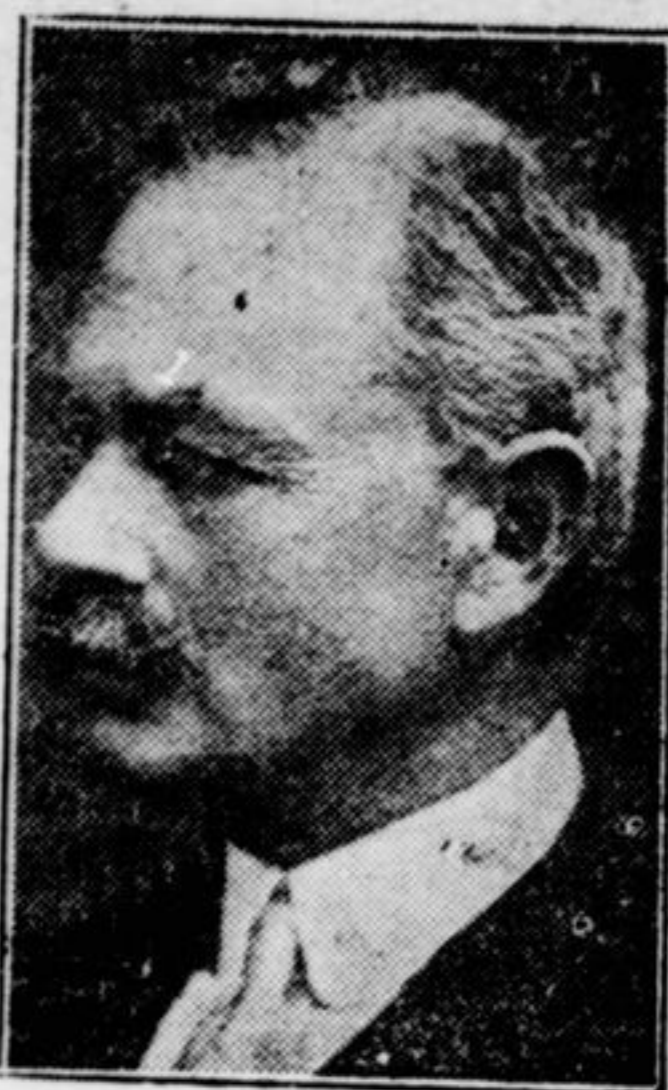


HON. ARTHUR MEIGHEN
